Raise levels of academic achievement for every student.

“That’s our mission in schools. Education is the gatekeeper to choices in life, and it is how we gauge our youth’s readiness for productive entry into society.

Teaching students the three Rs is, of course, a massive responsibility and a great first step in preparing them for graduation and beyond. Yet it’s not enough. There are additional Rs that our students must learn: Responsibility. Respect. Resilience. Relationship” (Souers & Hall).

So how is the Maquoketa Valley School District preparing its students in the additional Rs of responsibility, respect, resilience, and relationships? Teachers across our district are learning many strategies that align with *Fostering Resilient Learners: Strategies for Creating a Trauma-Sensitive Classroom* (Kristin Souers and Pete Hall). Using de-escalation skills, being aware of signs of possible suicide behaviors, developing our Wildcat Way expectations at the PK- 8 level and the Guidelines for Success at the 9-12 level, understanding poverty and its effects on our students and their families, incorporating a growth mindset when learning, knowing what adverse childhood experiences are and how they affect brain development in our students, utilizing positive self-concepts through our Positive Action curriculum, and creating and implementing routines into our classrooms.

Currently, we have developed a Behavioral Health Team consisting of teachers, secretaries, administrators, school counselors, and our AEA school psychologist. The goal of this team is to help create and support a culture where children and adults understand and manage emotions, set and achieve positive goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain positive relationships, and make responsible decisions. This includes building positive relationships with all students to better meet all students’ emotional needs, and help all students feel emotionally safe. During our team meetings, we’re discussing our reflections on the book *Help for Billy* by Heather T. Forbes and considering what knowledge needs to be shared with all adults in the district, along with what steps need to be implemented in classrooms. To date, we are in the process of developing a step-by-step action plan for implementing key findings from our readings to help all students learn academically, behaviorally, socially, and emotionally.

So how will all of the teacher learning affect my child? Knowing that when social and emotional skills are taught and reinforced with students in the classrooms, teachers increase positive teacher-student relationships, have positive classroom management and organization, increased student engagement and are better able to manage stress. Students will be able to recognize and build upon their strengths, engage in respectful dialogue with adults and peers, resolve conflict in a peaceful and respectful way, deeply engage in academic content, and advocate for themselves, their families, and their communities.

An elementary-level teacher from Sourers and Hall's research stated, "In deepening my understanding of trauma and its effect on children, I have learned to look for triggers and root causes of a student's actions. I have learned to look at a student's ability to cope with present circumstances and react accordingly, providing support and tools needed to give the child a sense of security and control.

When students are taught coping skills and productive ways to communicate their needs, their behavior, social skills, and sense of self-worth improve. I have seen how positive praise can completely change a child's behavior. When a school staff receives trauma training and implements trauma-sensitive practices, students thrive." This is the goal we continue to strive towards for our students, families, and adults throughout the Maquoketa Valley District.



Regular Board Meeting

March 25, 2019

The regular meeting of the Maquoketa Valley Board of Education was called to order by President John Zietlow at 5:30 p.m. in the High School Conference Room in Delhi, Iowa. All motions carried unanimously unless otherwise noted. Five board members were present. There were six staff and one visitor present. The agenda and the consent items were approved.

The Board reviewed and approved the 2019-2020 budget estimate as presented for publication and set the budget hearing for April 10, 2019 at 7:15 a.m. in the Middle School Conference Room in Delhi, Iowa. The estimate sets the proposed tax rate at \$10.21198 which is a decrease of \$0.35 from the 2018-2019 levy rate.

One open enrollment request in and two open enrollment requests out were approved.

The Board reviewed and approved the modifications to the 2018-2019 school calendar due to the snow days that occurred in January and February. The Board also approved the 2019-2020 school calendar.

The Academic Excellence Banquet is scheduled for May 1st. Ms. Sands will be the guest speaker for the banquet.

Supt. Tuetken will bring the final District Emergency Operations Plan to the board in June for approval.

The regular April board meeting will be held on April 22nd and begin at 5:30 p.m. in the High School Conference Room. A special board meeting will be held on April 10th at 7:15 am. in the Middle School Conference Room.

At 6:23 p.m. in a motion by Dabroski, seconded by Feldmann the Board entered into a closed session pursuant to Chapter 20.17(3) of the Code of Iowa for a collective bargaining strategy session. A roll call vote was answered as follows: Dabroski, Feldmann, Huber, Kunde, Zietlow; all ayes. Carried.

At 7:04 p.m. the Board entered into open session.

What's New in JK!

Junior Kindergarten curriculum went through a lot of changes this year, and JK students are working harder than ever! Positive Action is something new to our classroom that affects how students treat others and how they feel about themselves. 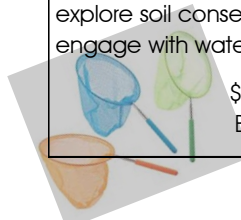
