As most of you probably have noticed, Maquoketa Valley has implemented some changes within the district and individual schools.

For one, the calendar is based on hours now instead of days. Mr. Tuetken said that this change gives us more flexibility with early outs and late starts. It also means that all of our early outs will be at 1:05 instead of switching between 1:05 and 2:05. Lastly, this allots for more time put towards the calendar. 
