The 2015 Stars Over Iowa Finalists were selected for recognition as part of the 87th Iowa FFA State Leadership Conference at Hilton Coliseum in Ames, Iowa, April 19-21, 2014. Twenty-two finalists were selected in four different areas: Agricultural Placement, Agriscience, Agribusiness, and Agricultural Production. The finalists were selected from a pool of 724 FFA members that will earn the Iowa FFA Degree—the highest honor the Iowa FFA Association can bestow upon an FFA member.

Maquoketa Valley's very own Kaleb Kruse was selected for Star Agribusiness.

Kaleb's SAE is market genomic elite dairy individuals and embryos all

over the world in partnership with his two younger brothers operating under the business name of KCCK. He's expanded to the Agribusiness sector when he purchased a high genomic heifer on World Classic Sale in Madison, Wisconsin in 2013. After Kaleb bought her, he sold embryos to many different countries as well as offspring around the United States. His business has grown from one original heifer to now merchandising offspring directly from her. The use of technology such as embryo transfer & in vitro fertilization help him to expand the genetics and merchandising business and contributed to his success.

The star awards recognize students who have developed outstanding agricultural skills and competencies through their career development programs and demonstrated outstanding management skills. 
