

School year to be extended, last day to be June 13



The Maquoketa Valley 2015-2016 school year has been extended for three more weeks. Recently, the Iowa Department of Education has contacted Maquoketa Valley to inform them of startlingly low test scores among the students. Because of these low tests scores, the school year is being extended to make sure students are getting a proper education. Results from the Iowa Assessments came in last week and after seeing record low scores, it was a unanimous decision to extend the year. The last day of school will be moved from May 23 to June 13.

This year, students were given incentives for reaching higher test scores, these incentives included field trips and other fun activities. Every student taking the test was highly encouraged to work hard and come prepared. Although, the encouragement and incentives weren't enough.

Back in January, schools from across Iowa were ranked in various categories. MVHS was in the 38% of schools rated Commendable. It was hoped that higher test scores would boost MVHS from being a Commendable school to a High Performing school. However, with the low test scores earned from the student body, MV is now a Needs Improvement school.

For all these reasons, the school year will be extended. The school board is standing firm with its decision. It is hoped that the extra time in school will prepare students for next year's tests. April Fool's!

The boys track and field team, under the direction of head coach Pat Meehan and assistant coach Curt Feldt for the third year, has made its name known at indoor meets and is preparing for outdoor meets.

The team is young with only six upperclassmen: senior Kaleb Handel and juniors Zak Harbach, Clint Krapfl, Alec McDowell, Bryant Meyer-Kemp and Kyle Wilson.

"These guys are at the age where they can compete and score in individual events," stated Coach Meehan.

Sophomores are Brock Hillers, Brenden Hogan, Sean Hucker, Alex Mc-Cusker, Mitch Neuzil, Angel Rumbo, Brody Sevart and Mitch Smith. "As a group these young men look much improved from their freshman year and should contribute significantly this season," stated Coach Meehan. "Most of the guys lettered as freshmen so they should be able to do that."

Newcomers to the team are freshmen Blake Becker, Tyler Britcher, Lane Coyle, Alex Digman, Brian Heims, Evan Hoefer, Daniel Hunter, Zac Lansing, Canyon Richardson, Tate Trentkamp and Norm Wilson. "They are adjusting to high school track and field. They are doing a good job in that respect which hopefully will allow them to contribute to the success of the team," added Coach Meehan.

Coach Meehan indicated the strengths of this team would be the sprints (100, 200), hurdles (lows, highs), middle distance (800), shot put and discus, and the long jump. Kyle Wilson was the 800 meter champion in the Wartburg Indoor and Tri-Rivers Indoor meets. Zak Harbach placed at Wartburg and was conference indoor champion in the Long Jump. The upperclassmen are poised to have a good season in the other above events. Other events will depend on the development of the freshmen and sophomores. A major concern this year is how much depth MV will have, which understandably will depend on what

contribution the sophomores and freshmen make, according to Coach Meehan.

Coach Meehan said Lisbon, last year's 1A state champions, should be tough this year. MV has been conference runnersup the last two seasons and can achieve that again, he stated. "We cannot control what the other teams will do this season," stated Coach Meehan. "Competing and working to improve each day is what we can control. Those are our goals. Teams that do those things usually have good things happen for them."

The Wildcat boys competed in the West Delaware Early Bird track and field meet Tuesday. The team finished fifth overall.

Medal winners were Brock Hillers and Brenden Hogan in the High Jump; Kyle Wilson in the 800 Meter Run; the Shuttle Hurdle Relay of Kyle Wilson, Mitch Neuzil, Alec McDowell, and Brock Hillers. The weightmans 4 X 100 of Brody Sevart, Kaleb Handel, Alex Digman, and Brian Heims also received medals.

Coach Meehan noted that many guys recorded their personal best which is quite good for the first outdoor meet off the year.

Girls track season opens with two indoor meets

Hey all you Wildcat fans! The girls track season is underway with an exciting first indoor meet at Wartburg last Tuesday. This meet did not have team points so you will just see the girls stats.


Starting out with the running events, in the 55m dash, Ashley Stogdill ran an 8.17, placing 4th in her heat. Brittany Sabers also ran the 55m dash in 8.91 seconds, placing 6th in her heat. Megan Mensen placed 5th overall and 2nd in her heat, in the 200m dash, with a time of 28.30. Also in the 200m dash, Brooke Wilson ran a 30.73, placing 6th in her heat. Megan Hogan and Maddy Anderegg both ran the 400m dash. Megan had a time of 1:13.06, placing 4th in her heat and Maddy had a time of 1:13.84, placing 5th in her heat. Kara Orcutt and Angela Wendt both placed 1st in their heats in the 55m hurdles. Kara Orcutt also placed 7th in the finals. Angela Wendt ran a 10.04. Kara Orcutt ran a 9.62 in her heat and a 9.90 in the finals. In the 800m run, Megan Rausch ran a 3:04.56, placing 6th in her heat and Mikayla Callan had a time of 3:40.91. Casey Fry ran the 1500m run with a time of 6:38.80, placing 8th in her heat. Nichole Winter also ran the 1500m run, with a time of 6:23.21.

In the relay events, the 4x200m relay placed 7th, with a total time of 1:57.14. The 4x400m relay ran a 4:28.35 and placed 7th. The 4x800m relay placed 11th. They ran a 11:09.63.

Now on to the field events. In the high jump, Brianna Mensen tied for 10th with a jump of 4 ft. 06 in. Madison Imler and Samantha Wall both competed in the long jump. Madison jumped 13 ft. 05 in. and Samantha placed 9th jumping 13 ft. 11in. In the shot put, Whitney Wilson had a throw of 29 ft. 01 in. Rose Havens also competed in shot put, throwing 24 ft. 04 in. There were many large schools at Wartburg, which provided great competition.

Their next meet was last Friday. They competed a great meet in the Tri-Rivers Conference Indoor meet at Cornell College. Again, this meet did not have an team points.

We will first start out with the running events. In the 55m dash, Ashley Stogdill ran a 8.08, placing 4th overall and 1st in her heat and Megan Hogan ran a 8.43, placing 6th overall and 2nd in her heat. In the 200m dash, Maddy Andregg ran a 31.81, placing 7th overall and 3rd in her heat and Madison Imler ran a 32.02, placing 10th overall and 5th in her heat. In the 400m dash, Kara Orcutt placed 3rd overall, and ran a 1:07.41 and Brooke Wilson placed 7th overall and 1st in her heat, and ran a



1:10.68. Next, are the 55m hurdles. Megan Mensen ran a 10.88, placing 3rd overall and 2nd in her heat, and Cassidy Wilson ran a 10.95, placing 5th overall and 3rd in her heat. In the 800m run, Rejji Smith ran a 2:49.51, placing 5th and Cassidy Wilson ran a 2:53.03, placing 9th. Nichole Winter and Mikayla Callen both ran in the 1500m run. Nichole ran a 6:21.96, placing 9th and Mikayla Callen ran a 7:05.40, placing 10th. Running into the relay events, we will start with the 4x200m relay. Megan Mensen, Aspen Britt, Ashley Stogdill, and Caitlin Schuman ran the 4x200m relay in a time of 1:55.65, placing 1st. They won this race by 1/100th of a second. It was a very close race, but they managed to pull past North Linn. Samantha Wall, Kara Orcutt, Brianna Mensen, and Aspen Britt all competed in the 4x400m relay. They also placed 1st with a time of, 4:26.63, inching past North Linn by a 6/10th of a second victory. In the 4x800m relay, Casey Fry, Olivia Hoeger, Megan Rausch, and Brianna Mensen all competed with a time of 11:30.83, placing 3rd. Caitlin Schuman, Brittany Sabers, Samantha Wall, and Rejji Smith competed in the Distance Medley relay. They ran a 4:55.22, also placing 3rd.

Finally, we will jump right into the field events. In the Long Jump, Samantha Wall jumped 14 ft. 07 in., placing 3rd and Madison Imler jumped a 12 ft. 01.50 in, placing 11th. Whitney Wilson got 3rd in the Shot Put, she threw a 30 ft. 04.50 in. Rose Havens threw a 27 ft. 08.50 in, also in the Shot Put, placing 12th.

The girls competed in their first outdoor meet at West Delaware on March 31st. Those stats will be in next week's Echo.

"There is a core group of multiple year state qualifiers who are good leaders that are ambitious and want to win. This area also has a large amount of very talented track teams, and the Maquoketa Valley Girls have been able to compete with those teams. We have a nice group of young freshmen who will step in and fill a lot of the gaps we had last season."

Coach Dunlap noted that not only does the team have 30-35 athletes, they are focused and willing to work hard to improve. "They are supportive of each other and there is an exciting winning atmosphere."

Coach Dunlap stated that the team should be strong in the mid-distances but needs to improve in the sprints. The team is also moving up to Class 2A this season from 1A last season. "We will still be competitive in most events."

Girls golf team led by returning letter winners

The girls golf team is counting on the skill of its returning letter winner, Emily LaGrant, Riley Sternhagen and Megan McNamara, as it starts its season.

LaGrant finished ninth individually at conference last year. Sternhagen finished 13th, and McNamara was 16th. Coach Andrews has predicted a finish in the top three for the team at conference this vear.

"We have great leadership from the upperclassmen at the top," stated Coach Andrews. "We need to find some underclassmen who can step up and fill out varsity lineup."

The team opened its season at Springville Tuesday. Team scores were not kept.

LaGrant won medalist honors with a 47.

Top MV JV girls were Faith Hunt 62, Kelsey Ries 69, Kelly Winter 71 and Chloe Roling 73.

"Overall I was very happy with how everyone competed for the boy's and girl's teams for it being the first meet of the year," stated Coach Andrews. "It was not the best night in terms of weather as the wind was pretty strong causing a cold breeze. This was a big meet to show us coaches as to what we have as we move into the full slate of our season. I was very happy to take medalist honors for both the boy's (Jordy Downs) and girl's (Emily La-Grant). I was also very encouraged with the freshmen and sophomore scores as some of them just started golfing for the first time a couple short weeks ago."

Elementaries to move to grade-alike centers

For the past two years, as a result of fluctuating class sizes, the district and parents have had conversations about how to provide stability when determining number of sections at a grade level and which buildings students are assigned.

This resulted in the parent meetings this winter and a vote at parent-teacher conferences to either maintain the current system or move to grade-alike centers. The results were overwhelmingly in favor of grade-alike centers (75%).

As a result of the votes and with Board consent, next fall Earlville Elementary will house preschool, Head Start, junior kindergarten, and kindergarten. Johnston Elementary will house grades 1 and 2, and Delhi will house grades 3-12. Communication will be coming this spring regarding open houses to be held at each center.

Do keep your head up. Take this transition of seasons as motivation to find whatever hope you may need in your life.


Don't be the April fool that takes April Fool's jokes too far. Make sure to have some extra fun on this crazy day but keep it within reasonable means.
