1. Prom is on Saturday, April 30 at 8:00 p.m. in the high school gym. All attendees must be checked in by 8:15.
2. The theme of prom is Burlap and Lace.
3. The Grand March starts at 7:00 in the middle school gym. Admission is \$1 for all adults and students K-12. The doors will open for admission to the Grand March at 6:30. Guests should enter thru the front doors of the Middle School. Mr. and Mrs. Moenck are announcing.
4. In the Grand March, the attendees will have two stops in the gym for pictures, so all parents have an opportunity to get a GREAT photo. Also, there will be a roped off area, please do not cross over this. We don't want to block anyone's view.

Hey Wildcats! The girls competed in the Starmont Girl's Invitational Meet on the 14th. They placed 2nd overall, with a total of 129 team points.

We will begin with the running events. In the 100m dash, Ashley Stogdill ran a 13.68, placing 3rd, gaining 6 points for the team. In the 200m dash, Maci Freiburger ran a 30.21 and Megan Hogan ran a 30.66. Maci placed 4th, gaining 4 points and Megan Hogan placed 5th, gaining 2 points. In the 400m dash, Sam Wall ran a 1:04.08, placing 1st, gaining 10 team points. In the 800m run, Megan Rausch ran a 3:05.60, placing 6th, gaining 1 point. In the 1500m run, Nichole Winter ran a 6:22.61, placing 6th, gaining 1 point. In the 3000m run, Nichole Winter ran a 13:38.33, placing 4th, gaining 4 points for the team. In the 100m hurdles, Kara Orcutt ran a 16.94 and Angela Wendt ran a 18.14. Kara placed 1st, gaining 10 points, and Angela placed 4th, gaining 4 points. In the 400m hurdles, Cassidy Wilson ran a 1:16.22, placing 2nd, gaining 8 team points.

Now moving to the relay events: the 4x100m relay team ran a 53.17, placing 2nd, gaining 8 team points. The 4x200m relay team ran a 1:53.86, placing 1st, gaining 10 team points. The 4x400m relay team ran a 4:25.84, also placing 1st and gaining 10 team points. The 4x800m relay team ran a 11:39.01, placing 3rd, gaining 6 team points.

The Sprint Medley team ran a 2:01.93, placing 2nd, gaining 8 points. The Distance Medley team ran a 4:48.78, placing 1st, gaining 10 points. The Shuttle Hurdle team ran a 1:12.45, placing 1st, gaining

10 team points.

Finishing off with the field events, in the Discus Throw, Alison Sheehy threw 97 ft, placing 2nd, gaining 8 team points. In the Shot Put Throw, Whitney Wilson threw a 29 ft. 10 in. placing 6th, gaining 1 point. In the High Jump, Brianna Mensen jumped 4 ft. 6 in. placing 3rd, gaining 6 team points. Maci Freiburger also competed in the High Jump, placing 6th, with a jump of 4 ft. 2 in. gaining 1 team point. In the Long Jump, Sam Wall jumped 13 ft. 10.25 in. placing 6th, gaining 1 point for the team.

Their next meet was the Maquo-keta Valley Girl's Invite Meet. Overall, they placed 7th, with a total of 28 points.

Starting out with the running events, in the 200m dash, Sam Wall ran a 27.00, placing 3rd, gaining 6 team points. In the 400m dash, Sam Wall ran a 1:02.71, placing 4th, gaining 4 points. In the 400m hurdles, Kara Orcutt ran a 1:11.28, placing 5th, gaining 2 team points.

Moving into the relay events, the 4x100m relay team ran a 53.02, placing 6th, gaining 1 point. The 4x200m relay team ran a 1:52.01, placing 6th gaining 1 team point. The Shuttle Hurdle team, ran a 1:10.69, placing 4th, gaining 4 team points. Ending with the field events, in the Discus Throw, Alison Sheehy threw a 110 ft. 2 in. placing 1st, gaining 10 team points.

The girls competed at West Delaware yesterday. Those stats will be in next week's Echo. Their next meet will be on Monday at CPU. On Tuesday, they will compete at Anamosa. And on Thursday, they will compete at Cascade. Come out and support your Wildcats in their upcoming week of meets!

Do take a trip down memory lane and put yourself in the shoes of a youngster. Jump in the puddles, play board games with your siblings, etc. Make rainy days the best days.

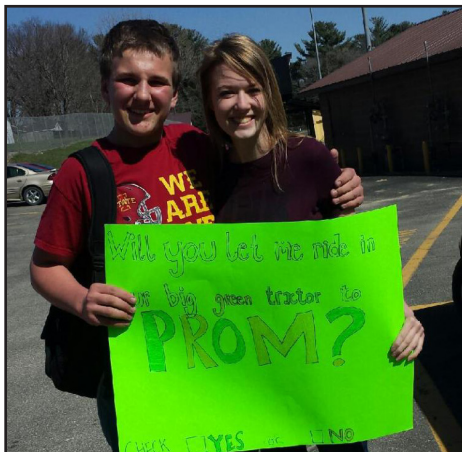

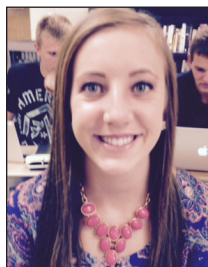
The diagnosis: Senioritis.

sels) earned a Bronze rating.

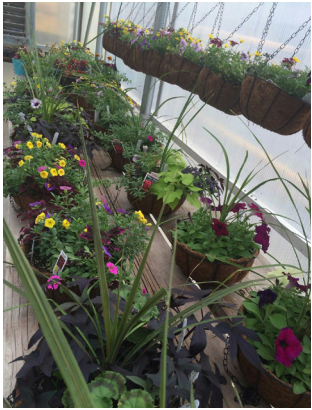
