Coach Andrews returns as head coach for the fourth year, and Mr. Besler is once again the assistant coach.




TEL chapter hosts "Hidden in Plain Sight"





McDowell, Downs earn All-American wrestling honors

While some students were getting some extra sleep, working a few extra hours or taking a family vacation, Maquoketa Valley freshman Chance Downs and senior Alec McDowell were competing in the National High School Coaches Association wrestling tournament in Virginia Beach, Va. where they wrestling their way to the podium to earn All-American status.

Downs and McDowell finished eighth in their respective brackets at the event held Mar. 24-26.

McDowell earned his invitation to participate in the tournament because of his first place finish at the state tournament in February. His bracket was filled with 66 of the nation's best 182-pound wrestlers in 12th grade.

Downs, as a freshman, could compete against other freshmen in the 145-pound bracket because of his berth to the state tournament where he finished seventh.

"This is the toughest tournament in the nation." —Alec McDowell, senior

Over the three-day tournament, both athletes had seven matches and finished 4-3.

"This is the toughest tournament in the nation," said McDowell.

Both wrestlers had motives for attending.

"I wanted to travel and reach the next level of wrestling opponents," said Downs. "I want to see what I can do nationally for my weight division and see how I rank and how I can improve."

McDowell concurred. "I wanted to win, especially against guys from around the country, not just Iowa wrestlers. Ultimately, it was for the experience and getting better."

McDowell noted how wrestling styles vary throughout the country.

Downs added that wrestling against opponents from throughout the country was beneficial. "I got to wrestle opponents with different styles from what I'm used to."

Downs and McDowell described East Coast wrestlers' style as "funky," as in





they don't like to be as physical and they like to scramble.

Downs was able to travel with his father, and McDowell was accompanied by his mother, uncle and grandfather. Both wrestlers recognized how this trip was more than just about wrestling: they enjoyed traveling and spending time with their family and going to the beach.

This weekend the two will wrestle at the USA Wrestling Folkstyle tournament in Cedar Falls.

After the tournament this week, both wrestlers said they would take a break. Will their quest for All-American status end there?

Downs said he's going to keep improving and aims to win a national championship.

McDowell plans to continue wrestling at college. He has not committed to a school yet.

Cassidy placed 4th, gaining 5 points and Angela scored 6th, gaining 3 points.

Starting with the 4x200m relay for the relay events, the team of Madison Imler, Danica Fjelstul, Wendt, and Caitlin Schuman ran a 2:04.19, placing 6th and gaining 3 points for the team. In the 4x400m relay, Kara Orcutt, Brianna Mensen, Olivia Hoeger, and Aspen Britt ran a 4:27.94, placing 1st and scoring 10 points for the team. The 4x800m relay team of Wilson, Britt, Nichole Winter and Mensen ran an 11:12.45, placing 2nd and scoring 8 points for the team. In the Distance Medley relay, Stogdill, Caitlin Schuman, Orcutt, and Smith ran a 4:54.64, placing 2nd and gaining 8 points for the team.

The girls meet at West Delaware last night was cancelled, so they will compete next on the Tuesday at Jesup.

Students and staff need to get ready for some changes because the remodeling project is underway.

Mr. Tuetken announced that Monday evening the Board of Directors approved the low bid from Tricon Construction for the high school remodel and addition project. The base bid from Tricon includes a new elevator, a set-building room, a locker room remodel, a weight and fitness addition, restroom and offices remodel, concession stand relocation and remodel, entrance remodel and clerestory, kitchen hood, lights and air handling, instrumental and green room remodel, ventilators and thermostats, cement work and/or

sidewalk replacement and some site work to the north side of the building. Exterior signage and updates to the casework for the auditorium sound booth will also be done.

As a part of the project over the next couple of summers the district will be replacing the gym floor and bleachers, updating the science and consumer science classrooms, working on roofs throughout the district, fixing boilers and replacing the gym floor at Earlville. "Along with these projects we will continue to provide appropriate technology for our kids as well as purchase buses and have the needed dollars to maintain our facilities," stated Mr. Tuetken.
