MV ran the ball over 235 yards with two rushing touchdowns and one passing touchdown. Quarterback Tyson Tucker went 9 for 16. Brock Hillers caught a 17-yard touchdown pass. Garrett Hogan ran for a 22-yard touchdown, and Tucker rushed for a five-yard visit to the endzone.

MV's defense was led by a strong D-line play by Digman, Heims, Gibbs, Feldmann and Wilson. Digman made an

As you all may know our school is being renovated, which should include many new and exciting features.




# Cross country teams ready to make some noise







# FFA stays busy during summer months


