The Wildcat volleyball faced a tough conference opponent last Saturday at the Cascade tournament and walked off the court with a win.

MV defeated last year's conference champ Springville 2-0 with game scores of 21-15 and 22-20.

Maddy Anderegg was 10 for 11 at the serving line, and Ella Imler went 10 for 10. Imler had 12 digs. Maci Freiburger and Emerson Whittenbaugh each had six kills.

In other matches at the tournament, MV went 0-2 against Dubuque Senior, Anamosa and Beckman Catholic.

Dubuque Senior won in close games of 21-18 and 21-19. Whittenbaugh had six kills, Helle had four blocks, and Anderegg was 8 for 9 in serving.

MV lost to Anamosa 18-21 and 12-21. Freiburger, Helle, Olivia Hoeger and Whittenbaugh each had three kills. Anderegg had 10 assists. Imler had 11 digs. Hoeger led in blocks with four. Anderegg served 8 for 8.

Beckman won 21-10 and 21-11. Freiburger led in kills with three and blocks with two. Anderegg had seven assists. Hoeger served five for five.

Tuesday night MV hosted a triangular with Clayton Ridge and Jesup and went 1-1.

In the matchup with Jesup, MV lost 20-25 and 18-25.

Freiburger had five kills and six digs.

The team had a serving efficiency of 97%. Serving leaders: Brooke Wooten was 9 for 9, Anderegg was 8 for 8, Whittenbaugh was 6 for 6, and Imler and Allie Knipper were both 4 for 4. Helle had two blocks.

MV got the win over Clayton Ridge, 26-24 and 25-21.

Anderegg was 12 for 12 from the serving line, and Imler was 10 for 11. Wilson had five kills. Freiburger and Hoeger each had four. Anderegg had 12 assists and 7 digs.


Cross country teams ready to focus on 'Wildcat Goal'

The Wildcat cross country teams consist of 18 boys and 7 girls. The boys return five letter winners from last year's team that placed second in the Tri-Rivers Conference and fourth in the State Qualifying Meet. Returning letter winners are seniors Jon Seibert and Tate Trenkamp; juniors Chance Downs, Mason Lubben and Derek Mensen.

Chance Downs and Mason Lubben had a good summer of training and look in good condition and vastly improved, according to head coach Mr. Meehan. Rounding out the boys team are seniors Canyon Richardson, Tyler Wallace and Lane Coyle; sophomores Ethan Doyl and James DeMoss: freshmen Preston Roling, Michael Schaul, Nolan Ries, AJ Ambundo, Cy Huber, Brock Trenkamp and Ashton Goldsmith. Canyon Richardson has three years experience. Coach Meehan noted that Ethan Dovl has come off a good track season as a 1600 Meter runner. The freshmen were seventh grade state cross country champions. Remaining varsity runners will come from any of these athletes. "Time will tell if this year's team will remain focused on the 'Wildcat Goal' - to use their talents every day to become the best the can be," stated Coach Meehan. "Good things will happen if they do."

LeGassick rushed 62 yards on 13 carries. Hucker made good on four of his passes for 72 yards. Derek Becker gained 58 receiving yards. Defensively, Wilson had three solo tackles and six assists. Michael Feldmann had four assists.

The team includes some players with some good experience. Returning starters include Norm Wilson, Alex Digman, Evan Hoefer and Brian Heims. Other returning letter winners are Derek Becker, Trent Koopmann, Mike Feldmann and Matthew Hucker, Coach Evers added that

The team's strengths are also met with some challenges. "We have had great senior leadership in the weight room," stated Coach Evers. "We don't have the numbers so depth is a concern. Coach Evers said the district (District 5 Class A) looks tough. He noted that Ed-Co and Alburnett return the most talent. "Lisbon has tradition and will always be in the mix. Clayton Ridge is a dark horse. The unknown is MFL, but having coached in Postville back in the 90's I know those kids are tough so I would expect them to be solid. We need breaks to get in the mix. It could be an exceptional year or one of those we will want to forget!" Coach Evers is at MV's helm for his third year.
