MFL- Mar-Mac, Ed-Co, North Linn and Monticello all advanced to the playoffs.

According to the BC Moore Ratings, we finished 25th our of 61 teams in Class A. Finishing ahead of many teams with more wins than us because of our tough schedule. In the IHSAA RPI we finished 39th out of 62 teams.

Parker Sternhagen Offense (Utility/Athlete)

-Parker led the District in total yards (1,757) and TD's (18).

Michael Feldmann Offense (Offensive Lineman)

-The anchor of our offensive line and he battled through a lingering knee issue all year.

Trent Koopmann Offense (Wide Receiver) -Trent led the district in Receptions (40) and was 2nd in Yards (433)

AJ Ambundo Offense (Wide Receiver) -Tied for 3rd with (23) Receptions and was 3rd in yards (414)

Andrew Kloser Defense (Linebacker)

-Andrew was 9th overall in the District and 2nd on our team with 53.5 Total Tackles.

2nd Team All-District

Derek Becker Offense (Running Back)

-Derek led the team in rushing yards (515) and ended the regular season with the 5th most yards in the district.

Carter Stahlberg Offense (Offensive Line-

-Carter brought toughness to our team. He never wanted to come off the field and played hard every single snap.

Zach Digman Defense (Defensive Line-

-Zach played a lot of snaps on both sides of the ball and his motor was always going. Zach finished with 34.5 Total Tackles and 8 Tackles for Loss.

Carter Kruse Defense (Defenseive Lineman)

-Carter was tough to block for our opponents. He finished with 19.5 Tackles, 2.5 for Loss and an Assisted Sack. The numbers don't show the disruption he caused on defense for us.

Owen Mensen Defense (Defensive Back) -Owen finished with 24 Tackles and tied for 3rd in the District with 3 Interceptions.

Honorable Mention All-District Timmy Harmon

-Timmy played Center and Middle Linebacker for us. He played a ton of snaps this year. Effort was never a question.

Andrew Holtz

-Andrew came back out for the first time since 5th grade. He provided the team with another receiver to throw too and was a guy we could play at multiple spots in defense. 2 Interceptions on the season and both were huge highlight type plays against Monticel--by Coach Arnold

Girls basketball

Coach Moenck is back at the helm and knows that he's looking for players to fill some big shoes after a 20-3 overall (11-1 in the conference) season last year.

"We talked with our kids that we have to do it collectively, that each person will have to add something extra to make up for what we lost," Moenck stated. "We have a lot of girls who can do many different things on the floor. This is such a great group to be around. As always, the kids here put high expectations on themselves and have some very high goals."

The team returns second team allconference player Ella Imler. First team allconference player Emerson Whittenbaugh is sidelined with a knee injury.

Coach Moenck predicts North Linn and East Buchanan may be the toughest conference opponents.

"We have the potential to be very, very good as well, but we will have to be ready to go every night," Moenck stated.

Boys basketball

With only one senior on the team, Coach Conner knows he has a young team to work with, but many of them come with some valuable playing experience.

"Our guys have put in a lot of work both individually and as a team, so I am excited to see our hard work put to use this season," Conner stated. "We are going to continue to make mistakes, but I would expect to see some great maturation from a lot of our guys."

Andrew Holtz, second team all-conference returns.

Coach Conner indicated North Linn, Alburnett and Ed-Co will be tough conference foes.

"We can compete with any of the teams on our side of the league, but we have to play our style of basketball at the best of our ability each night," Conner said.

Wrestling

The wrestling team is now under the direction of Kurt Hatfield, and he can see strengths in the team in their unity and desire for continuous improvement.

"Each one of our wrestlers will work on improving every day in practice, work on holding themselves accountable and know what they are worth," Hatfield stated.

He predicts Lisbon, North Linn and Alburnett will lead the conference.

Preserving a dynasty: MV welcomes new head wrestling coach

Maquoketa Valley wrestling has a long-standing tradition of success. Over the last five seasons, four state champions have been crowned under the direction of Tim Andrews. After last season, Coach Andrews resigned from his position. This gave Kurt Hatfield, the middle school wrestling coach, a chance to move up the ranks and take the reins on preserving this wrestling dynasty.

From a young age, Hatfield has been living the sport of wrestling. When he was very young, Kris Lenz, a youth wrestling coach, urged him to go out. With support from his mom, stepdad, and other family members, he decided to give it a shot and has never looked back. Hatfield recalled, "I was drawn to the competitiveness. You had to be better and stronger than that kid in competition. And in wrestling, you get what you earn. You get out of it what you put into it."

Hatfield continued to use this motivation through high school as he competed at the Iowa High School State Wrestling Championships in his junior year for West Delaware. However, when wrestling at the district competition his senior year, he suffered a season-ending shoulder injury.

After a brief time in college, Hatfield entered the workforce but wanted to get back on the mat. Coaching appeared to be the easiest way to accomplish this. With a little encouragement from Jody, his wife, he received his coaching authorization in early 2009. He first approached Coach Voss, his high school coach, in hopes of becoming an assistant to help build his dynasty. Coach Voss repeatedly told him that he wasn't ready. Finally, on his third attempt, Mr. Hatfield was granted an assistant coaching position for the 2009-2010 season.

While at West Delaware, Hatfield learned many valuable lessons about coaching. The most important included goal setting. He discovered goal setting pushed wrestlers to do their best in all facets of life. However, he still wasn't satisfied. After the retirement of Maquoketa Valley's middle school coach Mike Beatty, Hatfield was hired for the position. He proclaimed, "MV has some of the best parents, teachers, coaches, volunteers, school and program supporters around. Their dedication, support, and drive can rival the best." He knew that he had found his new home.

Two years later, once again another position opened up: the head high school wrestling coach.

As with all jobs, a higher position means more responsibilities. This position is certainly no exception. In this job, Hatfield will have to "line everything up, keep track of the kids' weights, keep the program on track, and make sure the schedule is correct" to have a successful season.

To help with all of these tasks, Hatfield has surrounded himself with a tremendous team of assistant coaches. He is joined by former assistant coach and MV alumnus, Brian Wegmann. A new face joins the team as well with the addition of West Delaware graduate and 2013 state runner up, Zach Muller. Through these coaches, he will give each and every one of the wrestlers the individual attention that they will need to grow.

Backed by a solid base of returning talent, Hatfield hopes to bring Maquo-

keta Valley Wrestling back into the state tournament spotlight. However, above all else, he looks to re-establish the hard-working culture that is essential to the health of the school as a whole.

With all of these pieces in place, Coach Hatfield is ready for the season to get underway in November. "As a new head coach at MV, I'm excited. In a traditionally strong wrestling program, this is a new era."
