The FFA chapter still competed in all of the contests that they had gone to in years past; however, we were more successful because Mrs. Grant set up practices for us to gain knowledge of the contest. This also allowed for Mrs. Grant to understand what these contests were about, since most of us went to them in prior years. These practices consisted of us reading the rules of the contest so we knew what to expect when competing, and us practicing the tests that were going to be given during the contest. Mrs. Grant was very heavy on us that if we went to the contest just to be there, then we should still be in school. She wanted us to be able to compete with every team that we need to in order to win the contest.

This fall we were getting ready to compete in the Iowa State Dairy Cattle Evaluation CDE. This contest included kids from across Iowa, all trying to win this contest and qualify for the National Contest in Indianapolis. Mrs. Grant was not going to have time to practice with us. She knew that we needed to do something in order for us to have a shot at winning it. A few weeks prior to the contest we received an email with a crazy amount of links all involving the contest. These links included: rules to the contests, past tests that could be used to practice, and instructions on how we should go about studying. In this contest we absolutely destroyed the competition. Having two of the team members in the top five while the other two followed closely behind. I, in particular, was the top individual in the contest. Our success revolves around the encouragement of our advisor, to not only go the contest to learn, but to go there to increase upon the things that we learned previously. We can now say that we are State Champions, and will compete in the national contest later this month. This year's national convention was one of the last big events that we went with Mrs. Grant because she announced that she will be giving up her job. She does this to return to her real passion within the medical field. She will serve as the laboratory manager at the Regional Medical Center in Manchester, a position she once held.

Mrs. Grant said she has enjoyed the "family" atmosphere at MV amongst the students and staff: "Everyone truly cares about each other, respects each other and are always pushing to bring out the best in all of us."
