Vocal jazz gets feedback, prepares for next stop by MV vocal jazz students


This past Friday Jazz Express and Smooth Harmony performed at Cedar Rapids Washington.

In 1934, 14 teens had a dream. They wanted to combine school and their love: agriculture. In order to do this, they had to get chartered as an FFA Chapter. Future Farmers of America, as it was called back then, was just a six-year-old program that only a handful of states participated in. Since starting at the national level in 1928, FFA became a highly participated program in many schools. Those that didn't have it available underwent the process to get chartered as an official chapter in their state. On March 13, 1934, those 14 teens finally got their wish. They signed their names and dated the charter to started Maquoketa Valley FFA.

Ken Hoeger engaged in the FFA program at Delhi from 1962 to 1966. Within that time frame, he partook in many activities such as attend the annual banquet, exhibit projects at the county fair, and keep records of their supervised agricultural experiences. In 1962, FFA was popular in Delhi. "There were probably about 30 kids in FFA...I graduated with about 15 in my class," Hoeger recounted.

In 1967, the Delhi High School underwent a change. Delhi, Earlville, and Hopkinton combined their schools, making one big school: Maquoketa Valley. Maquoketa Valley soon overtook the FFA chapter,

changing its chapter name to Maquoketa Valley at Delhi in the eyes of the state. However, since the chapter just merged with other schools, it still kept its charter date of 1934.

In 1969, a progressive new rule passed by the national FFA officers. They opened FFA membership to females as well as males. This had a huge impact on national membership, growing it to where it is today. According to the National FFA Organization, the institution has now grown to 700,170 members as well as 8,612 chapters throughout the 50 states of America, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

Lisa McEneny participated in the Maquoketa Valley FFA Chapter from 1974 to 1978. She recalled that some of her favorite memories were all of the proficiency winners and the many members that were active in the chapter at that time. She reminisced, "It was a really popular time for FFA in high school. All of my friends were in it and we did a lot of competitions. Overall a lot of people were successful." Maquoketa Valley has not only held champions, but they've helped people achieve their goals. which in Lisa's case, was the 1978 Iowa Holstein Princess. Lisa's passion for FFA didn't stop with her. Her children eventually went on to be very successful in their FFA chapter.

In 2018, another person with a passion for agriculture and FFA graduated from Maquoketa Valley. Amanda Engelken adored FFA. Through her four years, she competed in three national team contests as well as getting her proficiency, the records of her working at Delta Acres Dairy, to advance to the national level. She worked hard to be named a star finalist with her state degree. This success can be attributed to both her hard work and the chapter's leaders. With the help from Beckman High School, Maguoketa Valley had a joint program with over 100 kids and endless talent. "It was so much fun when you found great friends to hang out with," Amanda recollected.

Although many people with agricultural backgrounds are successful, there are also many city kids that are award winners too. Both the National FFA program and the Maquoketa Valley FFA program are home to members with and without agricultural backgrounds. FFA strengthens leadership, public speaking abilities, and networking. Because of this, the title Future Farmers of America seemed wrong for all the options someone has within the organization. Therefore, in 1988, the name changed to the National FFA Organization, hoping to show people that you don't have to be involved in agriculture to be a member of FFA. It's a good resource for every-

The FFA program at Maquoketa Valley is 85 years old, but one element has stayed the same throughout all of them. When asked their favorite thing about FFA, Ken, Lisa, and Amanda all said the same concept. They all enjoyed making new friends and learning new skills within the industry they love so much. Maquoketa Valley FFA has had an impact on almost everyone who has passed through those ag shop doors. Many people have found their passion, achieved success, and made lifelong connections. The blue corduroy FFA members sport unite us, but our love connects us, no matter where someone is from.

Name: A.J. Ambundo You've been double nominated for All-State large group speech. What events were you in? I'm in TV News and Group Improvisation


What do you enjoy most about large
