Be a strong, positive influence

Research has shown that those with high emotional intelligence have better attention skills and fewer learning problems, and are generally more successful in academic and workplace settings. We offer the following examples as a guide to help you continue to be a strong, positive influence on your child's social and emotional growth, and to reflect your own skills in the process.

Social and emotional intelligence involves understanding your feelings and behaviors, as well as those of others, and applying this knowledge to your interactions and relationships. Five concepts are based on CASEL's interelated sets of competencies.

- Self-awareness is knowing yourself. It's about knowing your emotions, strengths, and challenges, and how your emotions affect your behavior.
- **Self-management** is knowing how to control your behaviors and moods, and setting working toward goals.
- **Social awareness** is the ability to understand and respect the perspectives of others, and to apply this knowledge to interactions with people from diverse backgrounds.
- Having good relationship skills involves knowing how to establish and keep rewarding and positive relationships with friends, family and others from a wide range of backgrounds.
- Responsible decision-making involves identifying the impact of your choices on yourself and others, and using empathy, relationship skills and self- and social awareness to make decisions.

Unlike IQ, social and emotional intelligence can be enhanced at any age through thinking about these competencies and putting them into practice. You are your child's greatest influence, no matter how young or old your child is. Inorder to help your child's social and emotional development, you can model skills you would like to see. Many social and emotional skills are developed over time, and some adults are stronger in this area than others, as is the case with children.

Regular Board Meeting

March 16, 2015

The regular meeting of the Maquoketa Valley Board of Education was called to order by President John Zietlow as 6:00 p.m. in the Middle School Conference Room in Delhi, Iowa. All motions carried unanimously unless otherwise noted. Five board members were present. There were five staff and three visitors present. The agenda and consent items were approved.

All kindergarten round ups are complete. There are currently 21 students in Earlville, 16 students in Johnston and 15 students in Delhi. There are also 12 students currently planning on attending JK next year. Preschool round ups will be held in May.

Iowa Assessment results are back and will be shared with parents during spring conferences.

The Board reviewed and approved the 2015-2016 budget estimate as presented for publication and set the budget hearing for April 8, 2015 at 7:15 a.m. in the Middle School Conference Room. The estimate sets the proposed tax levy rate at \$15.42140 which is an increase of \$0.12 from the 2014-2015 levy rate due to the State not setting the State Supplemental Aid rate for 2015-2016.

Two open enrollment requests in and four open enrollment requests out were approved.

The following personnel recommendations were approved:

Patty Wilson-resignation as Concession Coordinator Janelle Parsons – employed as Concession Coordinator Curt Feldt – employed as Assistant HS Boys Track Coach

The Board tabled approving bus bids.

The 2015-2016 Shared Personnel Agreement with Maquoketa Valley, North Linn, Springville, Center-Point Urbana and Alburnett for Jane Mais as Human Resource Manager was approved.

Supt. Tuetken took a few minutes to update the Board on the TLCS process.

Dr. Laura Bohrer will be the guest speaker for the Academic Excellence Banquet which is scheduled for May 3rd.

At 6:51 p.m. the Board entered into a closed session for a collective bargaining strategy session as provided in Iowa Code 20.17(3). Roll call vote was answered all ayes.

At 7:03 p.m. the Board entered into open session.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:12 p.m.

I would like to congratulate several of the Delhi Fourth Graders for stepping out of their comfort zone and entering a poetry and creative writing contest held by the Eastern Iowa Reading Council (EIRC). This contest included students from Maquoketa Valley, Western Dubuque, West Delaware, Anamosa, Independence, East Buchanan, Jesup, and Linn Mar. Putting the S.T.E.A.M in S.T.E.M Elementary Middle School Art

S.T.E.M refers to the subjects of science, technology, engineering and math and a push in schools for students achieve higher in these areas. Yet innovation remains tightly coupled with these subjects in order to proceed. Adding art and design to the s.t.e.m equation sets students up to transform life in the 21st century.

Along with exploring the basics of composition, design and material use, elementary artists are playing with some s.t.e.m ideas.

Not New ... but BALANCED!

The "new math" seems to be a popular topic lately in the news, around dinner tables, and across social media. As a middle school math teacher for the past 9 years, I can honestly say that what I teach is not "new." It is how and when I teach existing math skills and concepts that has changed. Maquoketa Valley recently adopted a new math series at the 6th-8th grade levels titled Big Ideas. The textbook takes a more balanced approach, not new approach, to teaching mathematics. We have found that students who memorize and follow procedures without understanding the math behind them often do not understand what they are doing, why they are doing it, or when to apply these skills. Students have difficulties applying their learning to new types of problems. We still want our students to be fast and accurate in computing, but know it cannot be our only goal in math. Students need to have conceptual understanding, procedural fluency, and be able to apply new math skills and concepts when problem solving. In order to attain this goal of a "balanced curriculum," students must be provided time to practice and develop different strategies and representations (pictures, tables, diagrams, etc) of new concepts. They need time to make sense of the mathematics, have rich conversations, and make connections. Students who can explain what they are doing and why they are doing it, become more confident to use math in everyday life. In our fast changing world, the need for students with strong mathematical and technological skills is rapidly increasing. There is a need for deeper understanding and higher levels of problem solving. The math we are learning in the middle school is not new ... just better balanced!

Behavior Expectations

This school year a group of teachers and administrators have been working to update current building wide behavior expectations across the district. This team has attended several AEA training sessions to build background on research based behavior implementation strategies. Several things have been developed from these training sessions. We have established expectations for students among various school settings such as out for recess, at the drinking fountain, in the bathrooms, and in the hallway. To support these expectations lesson plans and reminder charts/posters have also been created. Currently the team is working on creating a plan for acknowledging students' positive behaviors. Also, a system to support teachers and students when these behavior expectations are not being met. Our goal is to establish consistent expectations across the district. It will be exciting to begin rolling out these updated behavior expectations and acknowledgements!

Summer Driver Education




Street Smarts will be the vendor providing Driver Education this summer. Students wishing to take Driver Education at Maquoketa Valley must be 14 years of age by **APRIL 2, 2014.**

Classes are anticipated to begin mid-May; they are expected to end in late June. Students will be scheduled to drive at least 2-3 times per week for one to two hours at a time. Class will be held at Maquoketa Valley in the high school auditorium. Once students are done signing up, a schedule will be sent by mail to all parents listing their child's driving time and class schedule.

The fee for this course is \$330 paid to Street Smarts by check or money order, or \$340 by credit card. This payment is due when signing up for the class. Any family that is eligible for free/reduced meals will be eligible for a waiver/reduction of this fee. Students may either be signed up online at: www.streetsmartsdriversed.com or may pick up a paper form at the high school office. Deadline to register is Tuesday, April 11, 2014.
