Superintendent Search

As most of you are aware, I have submitted my letter of resignation to our Board of Directors that will be effective June 30th of this year. It is with mixed emotions that this [letter was submitted](#). I am truly grateful for the opportunity that I have had to be a part of our District the past 15 years.

What makes this decision so difficult is that I have been extremely fortunate to work for an outstanding Board that truly understands that our mission is to do what is best for our kids. President Kunde went out on a limb 14-plus years ago to allow me this opportunity, and Director Zietlow has been a great mentor as I dove into this work. I will forever be indebted to them for this. I have had the opportunity to work with teachers and staff members that are passionate about their craft and the overall well-being of our children. Finally, I have been blessed to be surrounded by the best administrative team in the state, beginning with Mrs. Morrison, Ms. Swinton, Mrs. Kramer and Mr. Gatto and now with Mrs. Norton, Mrs. Becker, Ms. Imler and Mr. Osterhaus. I appreciate their loyalty, their open-mindedness, and their patience over the years working with me.

There is a quote from Charles Kettering that I believe is apropos to this resignation. "The world hates change, yet it is the only thing that has brought progress." I am extremely proud of what has been accomplished at MV under our collective leadership the past 15 years. I look at what we have accomplished with our student achievement; we have state assessment scores that are some of the highest in Iowa. Our facilities are impeccable, and we have upgraded all the technology for our students over the past 10 years. We have implemented emotional, social and physical supports to meet the needs of our children. On the financial side, we have one of the lowest school levy rates in the area and very stable financially. I am proud of the partnerships we have formed and the additional opportunities we have developed and continue to provide for our children. This includes the Dollars for Scholars Program, our Academic Excellence Recognition Banquet, our activities department and fine arts programs. I am also proud of the school relationships that we have established not only throughout our community but throughout the state. Yet I firmly believe that for our district to continue to move forward, and to be a better and stronger place for *all* of our children, as well as to continue to be at the forefront in education, we need new and fresh ideas. We owe this to our children. I believe the time is right for change. Our district is strong in all aspects, and this will give the next superintendent an opportunity to build on what we have started.

The regular meeting of the Maquoketa Valley Board of Education was called to order by President Donna Kunde at 5:30 p.m. in the High School Conference Room in Delhi, Iowa. All motions carried unanimously unless otherwise noted. Five board members were present. There were six staff members present and one visitors present. The agenda and consent items were approved.

The Board reviewed and approved the updated 2020-2021 High School Course catalog.

The following personnel recommendations were approved:

Amy Anderegg – employed as Individual Speech Coach

Doug Tuetken – resignation as Superintendent at the end of the 2019-2020 school year

The Board expressed their appreciation to Mr. Tuetken for the leadership he has given during his time at Maquoketa Valley.

The Board adopted the budget guarantee as follows: RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the Maquoketa Valley Community School District will levy property tax for the fiscal year 2020-2021 for the regular program budget adjustment as allowed under Iowa Code section 257.14. Roll call vote was answered all ayes.

Board Policy Series 100 were rescinded. The board then approved the updated Board Policy Series 100 on the first official reading.

The Board approved the call for bids on a bus purchase to be purchased after July 1st using SAVE funds.

Early separation requests from Pat Sabers, Cheryl Gates, Sue Goldsmith, Beth Mueller and Greg Drew were approved. The Board as well as Supt. Tuetken expressed their appreciation to Ms. Sabers, Mrs. Gates, Mrs. Goldsmith, Mrs. Mueller and Mr. Drew and their dedication to the Maquoketa Valley Community School District.

Erika Imler presented the board with information which highlighted several of the Districts key economic indicators. Enrollment numbers, solvency ratio, expenditures, salaries, settlement packages and insurance increases were all discussed. Updated property valuation information was also presented.

The Delhi Little League secured a grant to replace the existing Little League dugouts. This work will begin as soon as weather allows.

The 2020-2021 calendar will be reviewed at the February meeting.

Supt. Tuetken will begin the process of organizing a RFP to outsource the food service program.

Eric Henderson has tentatively agreed to be the guest speaker for the 2020 Academic Excellence Banquet which will be held on May 6th.

The Board will meet in a joint work-session with the North Linn School Board and Ray and Associations, the Superintendent search firm, on January 23rd at 6:30 at the Ryan Fire Station.

At 6:10 p.m. in a motion by Dabroski, seconded by Huber the Board entered into a closed session pursuant to Chapter 20.17 (3) of the Code of Iowa for a collective bargaining strategy session. A roll call vote was answered all ayes.

At 6:16 p.m. the Board entered into open session.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:17 p.m.

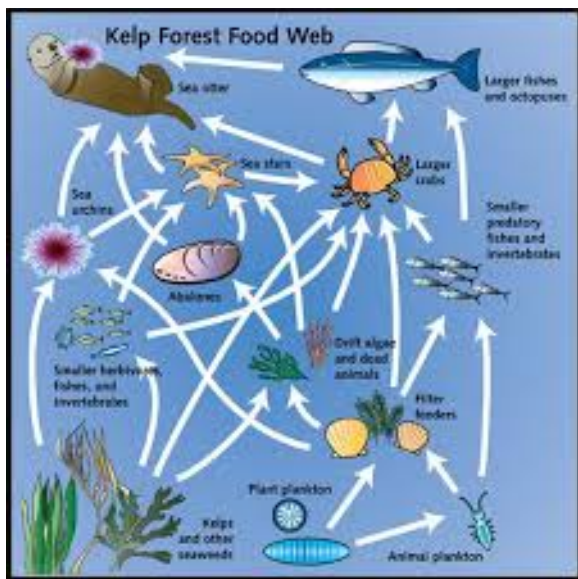
Mrs. Friedlein's Jr Kindergarten/ Preschool

In Mrs. Friedlein's Junior Kindergarten/ Preschool Classroom we have been busy learning about plants. During our literacy time we have been reading informational texts to understand key details. We learned the 4 basic plant parts and their jobs: roots, stem, leaves, and the flower. We have connected this learning with science by doing an experiment. We put celery stalks in blue and red colored water to show how roots carry the water from the ground, up to the top of the plant. This then turned the celery blue and red. The kids had so much fun seeing this transformation; they were very curious and excited to learn more. We are hoping to keep this excitement alive as we move through the rest of the year, preparing for Kindergarten.

Our school year is flying by in fourth grade!

Students in Mrs. Dever's class are having a great year learning together. Here in the third quarter, our writing focus is informational writing. Students are practicing researching different topics and creating ways to share their information. We write paragraphs, books, and even construct google slide shows to present! For a particularly memorable project, students researched an owl of their choice and taught about it to their classmates using a slide show.

In math class, fourth graders recently completed a multiplication and division unit. These students can now multiply two-digit by two-digit numbers, and divide numbers up to 6 digits long! These skills took tremendous perseverance to conquer. Just as impressive as their math skills are the character traits it took to be willing to show up every day and give their best effort. Now, students are learning about angles in our geometry unit.



Maybe the favorite activity in our classroom right now is creating food webs! Students are studying systems in science class, and we are focusing on the Kelp Forest ecosystem. Students can describe the parts of the systems and how they interact.

Thank you for taking time to read about what we are up to in fourth grade. There are many more adventures to come!

Stop and Think Before you Post

In this day and age, we have so many options for communication. We can have face to face conversations, write a letter or send a card, e-mail, text, call and utilize social media sites. Choosing the best option based on the content of the conversation can be difficult. No matter what needs to be communicated, it is important to stop and think before we speak or post.

Common Sense is a nonprofit organization that is dedicated to helping kids and families navigate the digital world. Below is a top ten list of things they recommend we think about before we post. Take the time to review these things with your children to ensure their online presence is a positive one!

1. **Remember the golden rule-** If you wouldn't want it said about you, don't post it about someone else.
2. **Don't Brag-** If the purpose of your post is to brag and/or get people to envy you, delete it.
3. **Avoid TMI (Too Much Information)** Stop and think, is it necessary to post personal information?
4. **Think about the reader-** Think about the reader when you are sharing. Will they think this is interesting? Am I posting too much?
5. **Keep relationship details to yourself-** A moment is meaningful even if you do not post about it.
6. **Don't be cryptic-** Be up front with what you are posting about. This eliminates the readers need to guess or fill in with their own thoughts.
7. **Quit complaining-** By posting a complaint, will it help me feel better or make the problem worse?
8. **Curate your photos-** Don't post pictures you would not want a loved one to see aka grandma, parent etc. Be cautious if you are posting pictures that include friends too.
9. **Change your settings-** Make sure only people you know and want can see your posts.
10. **Post Smart!** Spread kindness and friendship with what you post!

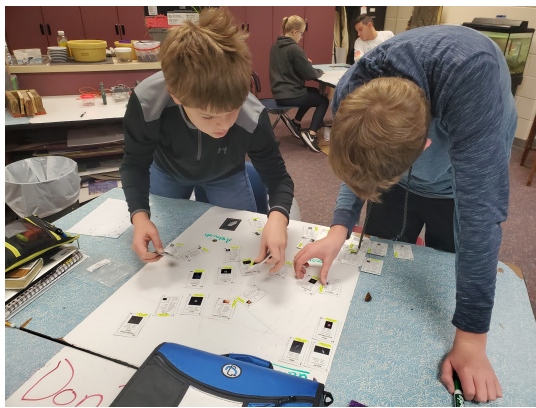

Use of Video Cameras

The Maquoketa Valley Community School District Board of Directors has authorized the use of video cameras on school district buses. The video cameras will be used to monitor student behavior to maintain order on the school buses to promote and maintain a safe environment. Students and parents are hereby notified that the content of the videotapes may be used in a student disciplinary proceeding. The content of the videotapes are confidential student records and will be retained with other student records. Videotapes will only be retained if necessary for use in a student disciplinary proceeding or other matter as determined necessary by the administration. Parents may request to view videotapes of their child if the videotapes are used in a disciplinary proceeding involving their child.



The Big Questions at Maquoketa Valley Middle School Science:

In Science class at Maquoketa Valley Middle School we practice the scientific skill of asking questions, just like professional scientists. Building a base of curiosity helps students in their future learning. This year we are asking questions about three major units in science: Planetary Science, Heredity and Adaptation, and Electromagnetic Force.

We began the year with the question, “What is our cosmic address?” We explored Earth’s place in the Solar System by using Google Earth satellite images to get a bird’s eye view. We used several models and diagrams to explain how the evidence of Earth’s spherical shape, tilt and revolution around the Sun creates seasons. We used mathematical models to show the scale of Earth to the moon and other planets in our solar system. Students were surprised to learn that if the Sun was the size of a large exercise ball, the Earth would be the size of a skittle, and placed approximately 200 strides away! We ran a simulation lab to find out how craters were formed on the moon. To find the answer to what causes the phases of the moon we used physical “moon-pop” models, a light bulb, and our eyes to witness the phenomenon of shadow created by the moon’s spherical shape. We ended our exploration of this topic by asking which is the best planet to live on. Unanimously, we decided Earth!

We are currently exploring the big question of how we can explain the diversity of life that exists on Earth. We started this unit by looking at over fifty slides of the weirdest creatures on the planet! From Blobfish, to a Bearded Tooth Mushroom, to a Komondor, students realized what a difference there was between organisms. Students revisited the use of the fossil record to answer the question of how life has changed over time. We added to the idea of the vastness of biodiversity when we explored extinction and recognized that 99% of all species that have ever existed on Earth are extinct! Looking ahead we will explore how species are related, how traits are passed on, and how populations of organisms change and adapt.

Our final unit will explore the big question of how invisible forces cause motion and energy.

By asking the big questions we are preparing Maquoketa Valley students to be scientists, explorers, problem solvers, and successful people in our future world!

2020 Maquoketa Valley Summer Driver's Education

It is time to think about summer driver education at Maquoketa Valley. Information about the class:

1)The class is only held at the high school in Delhi. Greg Drew is the instructor for both the class and driving.

2)Classes will begin **May 14th** and will end around June 21st. Classes will be held from 7:00-8:00 am before the school year ends; after school ends classes will be from 8:30-10:30 am. A group will be assigned to drive after school each day until school ends; once school has ended numerous groups will be driving each day. A schedule will be mailed at the end of April with all classes/driving/and times listed.

3)Students must be 14 years of age by April 1st in order to take summer driver's education at Maquoketa Valley.

4)It is required by the State of Iowa, that each student will attend 30 hours of class and drive 6 hours.

5)An attempt is made to schedule students from the same town's together to drive, so carpooling may take place, but we can not guarantee this will happen. Also, if your child is in softball or baseball, you must email gregdrew@maquoketa-v.k12.ia.us to try for the preferential driving times. These times are limited, so the sooner you let MV know the better chance of getting one of these driving times.

6)To sign up for driver's ed, please go to the following website: www.streetSMARTSDrivered.com Once arriving to the Street Smarts website, go down to MAQUOKETA VALLEY and click on it. You should then select CLASS REGISTRATION. Cost for the class is \$345, payable to Street Smarts. Students must sign up by April 15th to be in the class, after this date there is no guarantee they will be enrolled.
