#### "But I Don't Want to Go to Bed Yet!"

As parents, we have all experienced the child who doesn't want to go to bed when it is bedtime. They insist they aren't tired and want to stay up "just a little longer". However, sleepy children are not productive children at school. It is difficult for them to maintain their focus; they become irritable; and they may experience more negative behaviors in the classroom and/or with their classmates. Sleep deprivation in students has been linked to decreased student achievement since it affects concentration, memory, and the ability to learn.

Sleep tips from the National Sleep Foundation provide parents with the information they need to know about the importance of sleep. Children from the ages of 3 to 5 need to maintain a regular and consistent sleep schedule. It helps to have a relaxing bedtime routine that ends in the room where the child sleeps. The room should be cool, quiet, dark, and be without a TV. Limiting distractions is important for children to be able to settle in and get to sleep. These young children should typically sleep 11 to 13 hours each night. School-aged children, from ages 6 to 13, need 9 to 11 hours of sleep each night. The challenge at these age levels is many of these children have increasing demands on their time with homework and other extra-curricular activities outside of their school day. They are often times interested in watching television and using technology. These disruptions can lead to difficulty falling asleep and disruptions during sleep. For our older children, students at the secondary level are some of the most sleep deprived students of all, with our college-level students identified as the most sleep deprived population.

#### Regular Board Meeting

December 21, 2015

The regular meeting of the Maguoketa Valley Board of Education was called to order by President John Zietlow at 6:00 p.m. on December 21, 2015 in the Middle School Conference Room in Delhi, Iowa. All motions carried unanimously unless otherwise noted. Four board members were present. There were six staff members and three visitors present. The agenda and consent items were approved.

Ann Norton gave a brief presentation on the Iowa School Report Card.

A sophomore parent and student meeting will be held on February 4th. The focus of this meeting will be career clusters that the sophomores have chosen as their area of interest from Iowa I Have a Plan.

Language to board policies 400.011 Code of Professional Conduct and Ethics Regulation, policy 401.04 Recruitment, Qualifications and Selection of Licensed Staff, policy 702.130 Use of School Vehicles, 803.010 Purchasing and Bidding, policy 805.010 Care, Maintenance and Disposal of School District Records and policy 1005.060 Use of Private Vehicles on School Business were reviewed and approved. The board policy series 700 was also reviewed and approved.

The following personnel recommendations were approved in a motion by Kunde, seconded by Huber:

> Sara Tuetken - resignation as Delhi Food Service Tina Richter - employed as High School Study Hall Monitor

Supt. Tuetken was appointed to the Greater Delaware County Community Foundation Board of Directors.

The Board approved Sue Daker's contract for leading and preparing parent informational meetings which will be held after the first of the vear.

Supt. Tuekten gave a presentation on the Revenue Purpose Statement which will be shared with community members after the first of the year.

The Board discussed several possible speakers for the upcoming Academic Excellence Banquet.

Director Wise from the Iowa Department of Education will be in the District on March 4, Director Wise will take part in a MTSS session and an AIW session.

The Delaware County Economic Development Commission has requested a \$200 pledge per year for the next five years. The Board agreed to pledge \$200 this year and then review the request again next year.

Tuetken presented the board with Supt. information which highlighted several of the Districts key economic indicators. numbers, solvency ratio, expenditures, salaries, settlement packages and insurance increases were all discussed.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:43 p.m.

#### "But I Don't Want to Go to Bed Yet!"

There are recommendations for helping our children, and ourselves as adults, get more sleep each night.

- Stop using all technology 30 minutes before bed (ex: cell phone; computer; TV;
- \* Maintain a regular meal-time schedule
- \* Avoid caffeine

Keep a consistent sleep schedule for going to bed and waking in the morning

Develop a regular bedtime routine including teeth-brushing and reading a book.

In our schools, we are seeing an increase in a number of our students coming to school tired - heads on desks in the morning; yawning; and telling our teachers how long they have stayed awake the previous night. These things are keeping some of our students from reaching their full potential at school. Thank you in advance for establishing nighttime routines that will benefit your children so they come to school ready to learn each day.

So the next time you hear, "But I don't want to go to bed yet!", please remember the importance of regular bedtime routines and sleep schedules. With consistency, you are helping your child be more successful at school.

#### INFORMATION FOR PARENTS AND SCHOOL AGED YOUTH

If you, your family, or someone you know lives in the following situation:

- In a shelter, motel, vehicle, or campground
- On the street
- In an abandoned building, trailer, or other inadequate accommodations, or
- Doubled up with friends or relatives because you cannot find or afford housing

Then you, your family, or someone you know have certain rights or protections under the McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Assistance Act of 2001.

You, your family, or someone you know have the right to:

Go to school, no matter where you live or how long you have lived there. They must be given access to the same public education, including preschool education provided to other children.

Continue in school they attend before you became homeless or the last school they attended, if that is your choice and it is feasible. If a school sends your child to a school other than the one requested by you, the school must provide you with a written explanation and offer you the right to appeal that decision.

Receive transportation to the school they attend before you, your family, or someone you know became homeless or the last school attended if transportation is requested.

Attend a school and participate in school programs with children you are not homeless. Children cannot be separated from the regular program because they are homeless.

Enroll in school without giving a permanent address. Schools cannot require proof of residence that might prevent or delay school enrollment.

Enroll and attend classes while the school arranges for the transfer of school and immunization records or any other documents required for enrollment.

Enroll and attend classes in the school of your choice even while the school and you seek to resolve a dispute over enrolling your children

Receive the same special programs and services, if needed, as provided to all other children served in these programs.

Receive transportation to school and to school programs.

When you, your family, or someone you know move, the following should be done:

Contact the district's local liaison for homeless education (School Superintendent, 563-922-2091) for help in enrolling you, your child(ren) or someone you know, to continue in his or her former school. (Or someone at a shelter, social services office, or the school can direct you to the person you need to contact.)

Contact the school and provides any information you think will assist the teachers in helping you, your child(ren) adjust to new circumstances.

Ask the local liaison for homeless education, the shelter provider, or a social worker for assistance with clothing and supplies, if needed.
