Maquoketa Valley's State Test Results

lowa's academic standards place high expectations on students in order to make sure they have the critical thinking and problem-solving skills needed for the workplace or college. How can schools more accurately measure students' progress toward these standards?

To answer that question, and as required by federal law, the state has developed a more consistent and accurate measure of students' classroom learning that closely matches the state's standards. This measure is called the lowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress (ISASP). Last spring, all lowa students in grades 3-11 took this new state assessment in the subject areas of math and English Language Arts. A science test is also part of the assessment for students in grades 5, 8, and 10. The ISASP is a more challenging assessment, and better reflects what is being taught in the classrooms and how students are progressing toward lowa's grade-level standards. Because the test, and the bar for proficiency, is completely different from previous state tests, the results cannot be compared.

How is this test different from the Iowa Assessment tests of the past?

- 1. All students are tested in the spring, instead of districts choosing a fall, winter or spring testing window.
- 2. The test questions are no longer part of a national assessment, but are specifically aligned to lowa's state standards.
- 3. English Language Arts includes reading, writing, and language standards instead of only reading.
- 4. Students write essays and complete open-ended responses instead of only multiple choice questions.
- 5. The questions are grade-specific (with the exception of science) instead of covering a grade span.
- 6. The test can be completed online with technology enhancements and will be adaptive in the future (meaning the questions are adjusted based on how accurately a student responds).

SCHOOL BOARD MINUTES

Regular Board Meeting

December 16, 2019

The regular meeting of the Maquoketa Valley Board of Education was called to order by President Donna Kunde at 5:00 p.m. in the High School Conference Room in Delhi, Iowa. All motions carried unanimously unless otherwise noted. Four board members were present. There were four staff members present and nine visitors present. The agenda and consent items were approved.

Board Policy Series 900 were rescinded. The board then approved the updated Board Policy Series 900 on the first official reading.

Two open enrollment requests out and two open enrollment requests in were approved.

The following personnel recommendations were approved:

Ann Grant – resignation as Vocational Education Teach/FFA Sponsor Beth Tobin-Post – employed as Preschool SPED Associate John Grimm – employed as Middle School Boys Basketball Coach

Board policy series 100 will be reviewed in January.

Suggestions for the featured speaker for the 2020 Academic Excellence Banquet were discussed and noted.

Possible options to repair/replace the Earlville gym floor were discussed. Further discussion regarding this will take place after all bids have been received and reviewed. The work will take place this summer.

5th Grade Math

Hello from Mr. Helle's 5th Grade Math class. We want to wish everyone a fabulous new year. With the end of the 1st semester the 5th graders are finishing up their module on multiplying and dividing decimals by 2 digits. We have been using Eureka Math all year and the students have really grown in their understanding of math and numbers. We are excited to see how the unit on Fractions will be. This is where we are headed Once we have finished our unit with Fractions we will then finish the year with Volume. This is probably the unit students enjoy most because it is very hands on and encompasses all learning done to that point. We hope the 2nd semester goes as well as the 1st.

ELA Classrooms

We have been busy in the seventh and eighth grade ELA classrooms this year!

In December, we wrapped up our science fiction unit which began in October. In groups we read a novel within the science fiction genre. We looked at issues within the books concerning community, freedom, responsibility, and political ideas, and the students interviewed adults on those topics. Then they wrote a five paragraph essay about the novel in comparison with the United States, including changes suggested through the interviews. The students grew as writers, composing topic sentences and using supporting details and evidence to make their points. This unit also included rich discussions about our books with the members of the novel groups.

After science fiction, we moved on to our poetry unit. We are learning terms related to poetry and applying them as we write a poetry booklet which includes twelve poems. We also are creating an imovie by putting an original poem to music, matching the tone and mood of the poem to the chosen song. Finally, we will choose a poem, analyze the poem, and then share the findings with the class.

The seventh and eighth graders earned a well-deserved holiday break and will continue to grow as readers, writers, and thinkers in the coming months!

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS AND SCHOOL AGED YOUTH

If you, your family, or someone you know lives in the following situation:

- In a shelter, motel, vehicle, or campground
- On the street
- In an abandoned building, trailer, or other inadequate accommodations, or
- Doubled up with friends or relatives because you cannot find or afford housing

Then you, your family, or someone you know have certain rights or protections under the McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Assistance Act of 2001.

You, your family, or someone you know have the right to:

Go to school, no matter where you live or how long you have lived there. They must be given access to the same public education, including preschool education provided to other children.

Continue in school they attend before you became homeless or the last school they attended, if that is your choice and it is feasible. If a school sends your child to a school other than the one requested by you, the school must provide you with a written explanation and offer you the right to appeal that decision.

Receive transportation to the school they attend before you, your family, or someone you know became homeless or the last school attended if transportation is requested.

Attend a school and participate in school programs with children you are not homeless. Children cannot be separated from the regular program because they are homeless.

Enroll in school without giving a permanent address. Schools cannot require proof of residence that might prevent or delay school enrollment.

Enroll and attend classes while the school arranges for the transfer of school and immunization records or any other documents required for enrollment.

Enroll and attend classes in the school of your choice even while the school and you seek to resolve a dispute over enrolling your children.

Receive the same special programs and services, if needed, as provided to all other children served in these programs.

Receive transportation to school and to school programs.

When you, your family, or someone you know move, the following should be done:

Contact the district's local liaison for homeless education (School Superintendent, 563-922-2091) for help in enrolling you, your child(ren) or someone you know, to continue in his or her former school. (Or someone at a shelter, social services office, or the school can direct you to the person you need to contact.)

Contact the school and provides any information you think will assist the teachers in helping you, your child(ren) adjust to new circumstances.

Ask the local liaison for homeless education, the shelter provider, or a social worker for assistance with clothing and supplies, if needed.
