Summer Reading

O-and-A Chat With Deborah Reed

With the start of summer vacation, I thought it would be helpful to reprint the following article from Deborah Reed, the Director of the Iowa Reading Research Center. I believe all of us understand the importance of continuing to read to our children on a daily basis during the summer. If you do not take the time to do this, your child will fall behind their peers. The information shared by Dr. Reed will shed some light on the summer slide and offer ideas to prevent this summer slide.

Why does the summer slide occur?

Based on the data we have gathered through our studies of summer school across Iowa and with individual school districts in Iowa, we think the concept of "summer slide" is misunderstood. The current notion would suggest that students know certain letters, words, skills, etc. and somehow completely erase them over the summer. In fact, there are organizations that are claiming students regress by two months over the summer as though instruction in August actually should start with content from about April of the previous school year.

From what we are seeing, that is not what occurs. Rather, students who have difficulties reading, including those on Individualized Education Programs (IEP's), for literacy, experience a loss of ability relative to their typically achieving peers or relative to peers who participated in summer academic programs. The average student of all ability levels seems to be growing over the summer. The issue is that some students are growing faster than others.

Therefore, the students with reading difficulties appear to be worse in the fall because other students arrive more prepared for the new, higher-level requirements. So the question is not "Why does the summer slide occur?" but rather, "Why do some students grow faster in the summer when school is not in session?"

We think the answers are that the faster-growing students are reading for pleasure, involved in informal and formal literacy activities, exposed to richer oral language experiences, etc. Basically, students are learning incidentally.

That said, we do not advocate for incidental learning in the classroom. When we have students in formal education, we want to offer direct, systematic instruction to reduce the likelihood that learning is left to the chance of whether an individual student can "pick it up and run with it," so to speak. We want to be sure everyone has an equal opportunity to learn and achieve at high levels.

Why is the summer slide problematic?

It is bad to have students continuously falling further behind their peers because this accumulates over the years and becomes more challenging to overcome as students get older. If we could at least keep students parallel in growth over the summer to their betterachieving peers, then the teachers' well-planned instruction during the school year has a better chance of accelerating students' learning.

What specific things can parents/guardians do to help prevent or minimize the slide? Are there tasks?

Families of students with reading disabilities often think of summer as the time to give their children a break from something that is difficult, but doing that validates for children that reading is something they should choose to avoid whenever possible.

If we want students to think of themselves as readers, we need to help them see how reading is a part of their lives and not just what they endure during school. We don't want the summer experiences to feel like a punishment. The key is to present reading as an enjoyable activity.

To highlight how reading can be relaxing, families can encourage children to read for a minimum of 20 minutes per day. Children should read high-quality books that offer exposure to a wide range of ideas and vocabulary words. Families can support this by sharing in the reading time. Seeing adults read sends a powerful message to children that this is an important part of life.

When they take trips or visit sites, families should have children read about the area or exhibits before they go, spend time learning about the history or important features while they are visiting a place, and write about their experiences afterward. Even a trip to the store can present an opportunity to research a product by comparing prices, reading reviews, and evaluating the marketing claims made by the company.

So enjoy your time with your children this summer. From my past experience, believe me, it flies by. But take some time on a daily basis and make reading a priority with your children. If you do, then this fall your child will not experience the "summer slide."

The first day of school for 2017-2018 is

August 23rd, 2017

For the 2017-2018 school year, and all future school years, all students entering, advancing or transferring into 7th grade and born after September 15, 2004, will need proof of one dose of meningitis vaccine. All students entering, advancing, or transferring into 12th grade and born after September 15, 1999, will need proof of two doses of meningitis vaccine; or 1 dose if received when the student was 16 years of age or older. Proof of this vaccine will need to be provided PRIOR to the start of the first day of school or at school registration. In addition to the meningitis vaccine for those entering into 7th grade they will also be required to provide proof of Tdap vaccine. 2017 -2018 School Year Time Change

Students Attending the Delhi Center:

- *Students walking home or being picked up are dismissed at 3:25.
- *Students taking the bus home are dismissed at 3:30.

Students Attending the Johnston Center:

- *The shuttle bus to Delhi will leave at 3:00.
- *The shuttle bus to Earlville will leave at 3:20
- *Students walking home or being picked up are dismissed at 3:25.
- *Students taking the bus home are dismissed at 3:30.

The start time for the school day will not change and will remain at 8:00.

Using E-Registration and Online Payment of Fees

Once again the parents will be able to pay their 17-18 school year student fees, submit lunch money and update contact and emergency information on Powerschool. Student registration will take place August 8, 2017 from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. at the Delhi Center only.

Parents may do the registration from home or welcome to come to the school on the dates listed to complete registration and pay all fees. Parents are also being encouraged to pay all student fees using an online payment system. Student fees and hot lunch deposits may be paid this way, charging fees using debit or credit accounts. School personnel will be on hand to assist with the registration process or assist with E-Registration. The E-Registration has been updated that you may now update information in one child and will transfer to all children enrolled in school. It is important for parents to update e-mail addresses, as notices are sent via email notifying parents of early dismissals, makeup information, etc.

A link is located on the school website for payment of registration fees and the Powerschool link to update student information. These will be active beginning August 7, 2017

Sun protection basics

Considering that sun damage is the primary environmental factor in skin aging and skin cancer, we highly recommend that you start by reading this section.

In this article, we provide the summary of basic guidelines and principles to help you jumpstart your sun protection strategy. You can start here, but don't stop here - learn more to optimize your sun protection.

The very basics

Here are the key UV-protection measures adapted from the <u>recommendations of the American Academy of Dermatology</u>:

- Plan outdoor activities early or late in the day to avoid peak sunlight hours between 10 am and 4 pm.
- Avoid tanning beds.
- Wear a broad-brimmed hat and sunglasses.
- Sit in the shade whenever possible.
- Wear protective, tightly-woven clothing.
- Use a broad-spectrum sunscreen with a SPF of at least 15 on all exposed skin, including the lips, even on cloudy days.
- Use a water-resistant sunscreen if exposed to water, either through swimming or sweating.
- Apply sunscreen 20-30 min prior to exposure and reapply frequently.

Note: Please keep in mind that children tend to spend more time in the sun and need extra protection.
