"Today's Technology: How Do Adults Keep Up?"

As the parent of two children, now 21 and 18, I have watched technology develop for many years through the eyes of a parent, and also, through my role as an educator. I have been completely amazed at how quickly children pick up on technology. They typically have "no fear" of how to manipulate a device, a game, a piece of software, or a website. They embrace the challenge and seem to have a keen awareness as to what button to push next or what they need to click on to advance to the next screen. They are excellent problem-solvers and will find ways to manipulate their devices, websites, apps, etc. without needing much, if any, adult assistance. This tends to leave many adults "in the dark" about what their children are doing with all of the technology they have available to them. Children are growing up in today's world completely immersed in technology. While this can provide our children with wonderful learning opportunities, it can also be dangerous if not used responsibly. This abundance of technology leaves many parents feeling hard-pressed to keep up with the variety of devices. games, websites, and software their children are using.

I recently attended a meeting at the AEA in Elkader in which the website "Common Sense Media" (<u>www.commonsensemedia.org</u>) was discussed with those in attendance. I immediately thought about the value of this site as an educator, but also as a parent. This site offers parents information about technology by a child's age and by the source of media, including movies, games, television shows, books, apps, websites, and music. It addresses parental concerns in many areas including topics such as the amount of screen time by children; internet safety; and social media to name only a few. There is advice by age levels on this website including preschoolers (ages 2-4); little kids (ages 5-7); big kids (ages 8-9); tweens (ages 10-12); and teens (ages 13+) as to the top picks for movies, videos, software, apps, and websites. A few examples of the questions on the site include: "How much screen time is OK for my children?"; "How can I get my children to put down their phones?"; "What are some appropriate first websites for my young children to use?"; or "What do I need to do to keep my child safe on-line?" There is also a section for educators on this site including a curriculum. We have infused portions of this curriculum into our media literacy curriculum at school.

Regular Board Meeting February 16, 2015

The regular meeting of the Maquoketa Valley Board of Education was called to order by President John Zietlow at 6:00 p.m. in the Middle School Conference Room in Delhi, Iowa. All motions carried unanimously unless otherwise noted. Four board members were present. There were nine staff and two visitors present. The agenda and consent items were approved.

The First Grade Team of Tracey Reicher and Dawn Bries presented the board the implementation of standards based grading in the first grade classroom this year.

Based on results of the winter testing, letters are being sent home to parents letting them know if their child is "proficient/not at risk" with literacy expectations for their grade level; "at risk" if they are performing somewhat below expectations; or "substantially discrepant" if they are performing well below expectations. Any student who is performing well below expectations requires the parents to come into the school for a meeting. School and home develop a contract as to what the school and the parents will do to assist the student as they work to improve their literacy skills.

Information received from preschool parents through the mid-year survey was reviewed. The Preschool Advisory Committee will meet on Thursday, March 5th to review the survey results as well.

The Board adopted the budget guarantee as follows: RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the Maquoketa Valley Community School District will levy property tax for fiscal year 2015–2016 for the regular program budget adjustment as allowed under Iowa Code section 257.14.

One open enrollment request in and two open enrollment requests out were approved.

Supt. Tuetken took a few minute to update the board with the districts TLC process as well as shared a TLC FAQ document that was recently shared with staff about the TLC positions. Supt. Tuetken and Erika Imler attended a budget preparation workshop in Cedar Falls held on January 29th. Supt. Tuetken took a few minutes to share preliminary information for the workshop regarding the 2015-2016 budget.

Supt. Tuetken shared property valuation information for FY15 and FY16 as well as a history of property tax levy rates.

On Thursday, February 5th, an agent from the lowa Homeland Security Office out of Des Moines toured the buildings and offered suggestions on how to improve the security of all centers.

At 7:14 p.m. the Board entered into a closed session for a collective bargaining strategy session as provided in Iowa Code 20.17(3). Roll call vote was answered all ayes.

At 8:00 p.m. the Board entered into open session.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:01 p.m.

Earlville Kindergarten

It is amazing how quickly the school year is going, especially in Kindergarten! The first half of the school year the students learned all of their sounds and how to blend those sounds together to read words. After Christmas we started doing Daily 5 rotations and Guided Reading groups. The children get to learn and practice many literacy and writing skills daily. Now they are all reading books and discussing the main idea, author's purpose, making predictions and drawing conclusions. In writing they are learning to write a complete sentence that includes a capital letter at the beginning and the correct punctuation at the end. Many of them are able to write 2-4 sentences about a topic. It is truly amazing to watch the progress they make during these next few months.

In math we have completed our chapters on Addition and Subtraction. The students had a lot of fun with the games and hands-on learning that went with these skills. We are now learning about numbers 11-20, and then will end the year with Shapes and Measurement.

Solfege...Sol...what?

'Do, a deer, a female deer. Re, a drop of golden sun...' May be you have heard this popular show tune from the musical, "The Sound Of Music", but what is this 'do re mi fa so la ti do' they sing of in the song, "Do, Re Mi"? It is called solfeggio or solfege. Solfege is a method of teaching sight singing and pitch to music students.

Instruments have holes to cover, keys, buttons and valves to push, and slides to move to help in the creation of pitch. Our voices do not have any of these and so we rely on our ears to help us in creating the proper pitches of a song. Solfege is a method of using hand signs and ear training to help in the reading and singing of music.

At Maquoketa Valley, students begin using solfeggio in late kindergarten and continue on up through high school. The lessons begin with simple two and three note patterns of so mi and la and gradually build from there. When the pitches and solfege hand signs are introduced, the students will follow the teacher's hand signs. They then read pitches from the board while using hand signs. At this point the students are ready to read and sing the notes from the actual music by singing the pitch syllables of the notes while hand signing.

With this method, the students can read a melody and sing it without having heard it (sight singing). The proof that solfeggio works is when the students are able to accurately read and sing new music without the help of the piano or a recording. When learning a new song in this way, they are asked, "Who taught you this song?", and then they can all say, "We taught ourselves!".

Street Smarts is the vendor providing Driver Education at Maquoketa Valley. Students wishing to take Driver's Ed at MVHS must be 14 years of age by April 1, 2015.

Our Northern Neighbors, Money and Achievement

You have recently seen or heard reference to Iowa's 35th in the nation ranking and \$1,612 expenditure gap compared to the rest of the nation. These statistics are extremely concerning because we know an adequate investment in education is a necessary condition to improve outcomes and opportunities for all of our students. With discussion of school start date limitations, there have been conjectures that starting school later either does not impact or might even improve student achievement, since Wisconsin and Minnesota start later than Iowa and "their achievement is better."

Achievement and Demographics

lowa, Minnesota, and Wisconsin are very similar in many aspects of student performance and not surprisingly, demographics. Missouri, Iowa's neighbor to the south, is also included for comparison purposes, in the following table:

lowa's achievement is relatively close to our neighbors in terms of NAEP scores and outperforms our neighbors in graduation rates even though we are funded significantly lower. The following details relate to per pupil expenditures, where lowa clearly lags our neighbors to the north, by \$2,168 in Minnesota to \$1,869 in Wisconsin and to the south, Missouri, which spends \$658 more per pupil.

Expenditures per pupil: Without adequate funding, Iowa schools will continue to tread water. If we want Iowa schools to be world-class, all of us need to remind our state leaders about our inadequate inputs for education, such as per pupil expenditures. It is clear from the data, the school start date does not effect achievement, it is the correlation between adequate funding and student achievement.


Investing in Continued Success

Imagine what would be possible if Iowa students were funded at the national average, an additional \$1,612 more per pupil than is currently spent. Most educators believe that 6% is necessary to provide a world-class education and to move Iowa children beyond the national average, but we do recognize that the current budget situation makes that difficult to provide in FY 2016. The Legislature and Governor need to move quickly to reach an agreement to provide 4% growth in school funding for the FY 2016 school year. The 2016-2017 rate should be set within 30 days of the release of the Governor's budget, returning to the practice required in Iowa law (Iowa Code 257.8).


If there is going to be a change in the status of our funding for next school year, our state leaders need to hear from you and your concerns about the obligation they have to adequately fund our future, our children.

Schools need sufficient notice to anticipate revenue, make timely staffing decisions, and thoughtfully plan to invest funds wisely for student learning. The future of Iowa's students and our state's continued success depend on a solid investment in the priority of public education.
