Regular Board Meeting

February 26, 2018

The regular meeting of the Maquoketa Valley Board of Education was called to order by President John Zietlow at 6:00 p.m. in the High School Conference Room in Delhi, Iowa. All motions carried unanimously unless otherwise noted. Five board members were present. There were six staff and two visitors present. The agenda and consent items were approved.

Language changes to board policy 402.04 Licensed Employee Compensation, 402.05 Licensed Employee Compensation Advancement, 402.06 Licensed Employee Continue Education Credit, 402.07 Licensed Employee Compensation for Extra Duty, 402.08 Licensed Employee Tax Shelter Programs, 408.08 Classified Employee Tax Shelter Programs and 803.080 Payroll Deductions were reviewed. The Board approved to waive the second reading and adopt these policies on the first official reading.

The Board rescinded board policy 402.05 Licensed Personnel Supplemental Salary Schedule, 402.06 Licensed Personnel Employee Benefits and 408.040 Insurance Benefits Classified Personnel on the first official reading. The Board approved to waive the second reading and rescind these policies on the first official reading.

In a motion by Feldmann, seconded by Huber the Board approved Maquoketa Valley's Special Education Delivery Plan. This plan will be reviewed every five years.

Five open enrollment requests in and two open enrollment requests out where approved.

The Board adopted the budget guarantee as follows: RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the Maquoketa Valley Community School District will levy property tax for the fiscal year 2018-2019 for the regular program budget adjustment as allowed under lowa Code section 257.14. Roll call vote was answered all ayes.

Supt. Tuetken shared information from the budget workshop that he and Ms. Imler recently attended in Owlein. Five-year projection information was also discussed.

Supt. Tuetken shared the tentative 2018-2019 school calendar. The school year will consist of 1130 student contact hours with an additional eight early out days added for to improve consistency of teacher professional development. The final calendar will be approved in March.

The regular April board meeting will be held on April 23rd. A special meeting has been scheduled for April 4th at 7:15 a.m. in order to certify the FY19 budget so Ms. Imler may certify with the Department of Management by April 16th.

Supt. Tuetken has contacted local law enforcement to discuss holding ALICE training with staff and students in the fall.

Supt. Tuetken as well as the Board expressed their appreciation to the Maquoketa Valley Athletic Boosters for all their recent projects which include replacing the bleachers at the softball/baseball complex and installing a batting cage in the Earlville gym.

Additional weekend hours will be added to the fitness room in the near future. Patrons will be allowed to use the fitness room from 6 am. to 6 p.m. on Saturday and 12 p.m. to 7 p.m. on Sunday.

At 7:02 p.m. in a motion by Dabroski, seconded by Feldmann the Board entered into a closed session pursuant to Chapter 20.17 (3) of the Code of Iowa for a collective bargaining strategy session. A roll call vote was answered all ayes.

At 7:10 p.m. the Board entered into open session.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:11 p.m.


One word is brief and concise, yet powerful. One word - sometimes that is all you need because one word CAN speak volumes!

What is WIN time?

If you have an elementary student you may hear them or their teachers talk about WIN time. What exactly happens during WIN time you might ask? WIN stands for "Whatever I Need". For students in grades JK-5 there is a 30-40 minute WIN period each day that is set aside for teachers to help your child with whatever skills they might need retaught or challenged in. During weekly collaboration meetings (PLCs) grade alike teachers plan WIN groups for the week based on where they see individual student needs. They use data they collected from math exit tickets (little mini math guizzes) and reading assessments to create WIN groups. If you child has a Multi-Tiered Structured Support Plan (MTSS) they may also receive that intervention during this time. Since the realignment to grade alike centers teachers can provide WIN instruction among mixed groups of same grade students. This is a way to maximize supports and resources within the district. New this year, our Title 1 and resource teachers have been working with a grade level to support re-teaching during WIN time. This has provided even more opportunities to help students. Our goal at MV is ensure a timely response to all students' needs. WIN time is just one way that we are reaching this goal and providing your child with what they need to strengthen their academic skills! WIN time is a win, win for everyone!

How About a Little Math?

MS Math by Melissa Bush

Multiply 180 days x 3 years. What do you get?
540 class periods of middle school math.

Multiply 540 class periods x 45 minutes. What do you get?
24,300 minutes spent working with my current 6th grade students.

Divide 24,300 minutes by 60 minutes. What do you get?

Divide 24,300 minutes by 60 minutes. What do you get?

405 hours in Room 304.

Wow! Words can't express how thankful I am for the opportunity to walk along side our 6th, 7th and 8th grade math students as they learn to persevere through difficult problems, accept their mistakes as part of the learning process and become confident in their own abilities to solve complex problems.

What does a typical day in Middle School Math look like?

As the students enter the room, they check the whiteboard for their first 3-5 minute task of the day. This task can include a review problem, a higher order thinking question or a problem that "sets the stage" for our lesson. Students start with quiet think time, often turn and talk with a partner and then are expected to share their strategy(s) with the class. Listening to and responding to the mathematical thinking of each other is highly valued in Room 304. We look forward to finding more than one way to correctly think about or solve a problem.

Our daily lesson often consists of one 25 min task or two 15 min tasks. These activities allow students to explore a new concept by looking for patterns, making connections between what they know and what they are trying to figure out, drawing conclusions or making "rules" for solving other similar problems and writing their thinking in a way that others can follow and understand. We then will pull back together for our "debrief." During this time, students will share what worked and what didn't work. Together we will "land the plane" or determine what we now know, that we didn't know before. Students are often asked to complete an exit slip out the door (5 minute assignment that will quickly show me if they understood the lesson). Most lessons take us at least 2 days. The 2nd day often includes a directly, instructed mini-lesson (of what we learned the day before) and time to practice the new concept in class.

The bell rings, we stop working on math and Mrs. Bush dismisses the class by saying, "Choose to have a great day."

(REPEATED 540 times!)
