Donna Kunde - Area 1 Doug Dabroski - Area 2 Chris Huber - Area 3 Mike Feldmann - Area 4 John Zietlow Area 5 This school year marked the fourth year at Maquoketa Valley of the Teacher Leadership and Compensation program in which teachers assume leadership roles and spend a portion of their day assisting teachers to improve student achievement. Here's a look into what we do in our roles:

6-12 Universal Instruction Coach (Diane Temple): My goal is to help teachers enact a rigorous, engaging curriculum. Many of my efforts have been directed toward improving literacy instruction and aligning assessments, learning progressions, and unit objectives. I also help teachers find resources, model teaching techniques, and assist teachers with goal-setting.

6-12 MultiTiered System of Support Interventionist (Jackie Moorman): Throughout the day I spend time working with teachers and struggling learners in 6th-12th grade. I help students organize their classroom materials and assist in assignments from the general education classroom. I also help teachers create interventions in reading, math, and behavior to help close achievement gaps between the student and their grade level peers.

JK5 MultiTiered System of Support Interventionist (Tiersa Frasher): One major goal that we have been working toward this year within our elementary intervention system has been collecting, organizing and creating a systematic approach to supporting students who are struggling in the area of reading. Elementary special education teachers, our Title One instructors, and I have collaborated during professional development time to find the best literacy intervention resources available to assist teachers and students in reaching their reading goals. A similar system utilizing informal assessment data from chapter tests and lesson exit tickets is also used to determine which students may need additional intervention support outside of general reteaching during students WIN time (Whatever I Need) is also in place for math.

A large piece of the elementary intervention system is assisting students and teachers with behavior supports. This type of support is very individualized based on student needs utilizing interventions from a research based bank of behavior supports that we have been building since the Teacher Leadership and Compensation program has been started at Maquoketa Valley. All of these supports are in place to ensure that no student will fall through the cracks and all students will be supported to the best of our abilities to reach their goals!

K12 Technology Coach (Ali Scherrman): Throughout the day, I spend a lot of time introducing students and teachers to new technology and new ways of thinking. Our main goal is to increase work with the Universal Constructs known as the 4 C's: Creativity, Communication, Collaboration, and Critical Thinking. Through my 6th grade Technology class and my Kindergarten through 4th grade Makerspace lessons, students are given opportunities to problem solve in ways that allow students to work through the 4 C's. I have also spent a good deal of time applying for grants for our district to obtain the new technology. The newest grant that we were fortunate enough to get, the Making STEM Connections through the Science Center of Iowa and the Iowa Governor's STEM Council, has allowed the high school to also join in the Makerspace movement. This grant has given us many tools and technology such as a sewing machine, 3D pen, GoPro camera, and much more worth over \$5,000 and Maquoketa Valley received three of these grants! The Foundation for the Future of Delaware County also provided a 3D printer for the high school in 2018. Through these grants we have received over the last three years, all Maquoketa Valley students have been exposed to over \$25,000 worth of technology that is providing them the opportunities to think in new ways which mirror thinking that new jobs in our technological world need.

Authentic Intellectual Work Coaches (Christina Rudd, Jackie Moorman, Diane Temple, Jen Ries): We continue to lead teachers in grades 6-12 in their weekly professional development time as teachers provide feedback to one another's tasks, student work, and instruction in order to enhance student learning. This year we are focusing on instruction. During our collaboration time, teachers watch recorded lessons within our classrooms and use the framework to score these lessons on higher order thinking, student understanding and engagement, and realworld relevance. Then teachers talk about evidence we see in the lessons and cross reference if we are hitting our Core Standards. This time is also used to discuss suggestions and enhancements we can then take back to our classrooms and therefore improve student learning.

Parent/Teacher Conferences

The dates for the second Parent-Teacher Conferences of this school year are **Tuesday**, **March 12** and **Thursday**, **March 14**, from 3 PM - 7 PM both evenings.

These times are the same for all three elementary centers, the Middle School and High School. All conferences are held at the Delhi Center.

There will be NO SCHOOL on, Friday, March 15.

All Jr. Kindergarten. through 6th grade conferences will be scheduled by appointment, and letters will be sent home to parents to confirm the appointment.

The 7th & 8th graders will also have scheduled fifteen minute conferences. Parents will be assigned to one of your child's teachers who will have all information about your child and their grades from their other classes and teachers. If you feel that you need to talk to any other teachers about your child, we will post conference schedules outside of each classroom. Therefore, if a teacher is not conferencing, feel free to talk with them. If this doesn't work we will be more than happy to have a staff member call you or set up a time to meet with you.

High School teachers will be set up in the High School gymnasium, and parents are invited to speak with any or all of their child's teachers at their convenience during the time allowed. High School report cards will be given to parents by the secretaries in the front foyer of the building. Any High School report cards not picked up during the conference times will be sent home with the students.

Regular Board Meeting February 25, 2019

The regular meeting of the Maquoketa Valley Board of Education was called to order by President John Zietlow at 5:30 p.m. in the High School Conference Room in Delhi, Iowa. All motions carried unanimously unless otherwise noted. Five board members were present. There were four staff and two visitors present. The agenda and consent items were approved.

The Board approved the call for bids on a bus purchase to be purchased after July 1st using SAVE funds.

Five open enrollment requests in and five open enrollment requests out were approved.

The Board tabled reviewing and approving board policies

The following personnel recommendations were approved:

Ron Besler – approved as Assistant Golf Coach

The Board approved the Pepsi Beverages contract which will be in place until February of 2024.

The following operational sharing agreements for the 2019-2020 school year were approved:

Anthony Olson – shared Transportation with North Linn Doug Tuetken – shared Superintendent with North Linn Erika Imler – shared School Business Official with North Linn

Supt. Tuetken shared preliminary information from the FY20 budget. More information will be presented at the March meeting.

Plans for making up student and staff days was shared with the Board. As of the meeting date, the final student day will be May 30th.

Supt. Tuetken shared projected elementary class sizes for the 2019-2020 school year. It appears that all classes will remain at three sections with the exception of third grade, which will have two sections.

Supt. Tuetken shared information regarding the Emergency Operation Plan that he has been working on preparing. A plan will be created for the district, the Delhi Campus, the Earlville Campus and the Johnston Campus. Supt. Tuetken will bring the final plans to the Board in June for approval.

Supt. Tuetken shared information regarding a Behavioral Management Strategist position that will be implemented at the Delhi Campus for the 2019-2020 school year. A brief job description was shared. This position will partially be funded with At-Risk Funds. Supt. Tuetken will advertise for this position internally to gauge interest and then on Teach lowa if we can't fill internally.

The regular April board meeting will be held on April 22nd. A special meeting has been scheduled for April 10th at 7:15 a.m. in order to certify the FY20 budget so Ms. Imler may certify with the Department of Management by April 15th.

At 6:18 p.m. in a motion by Dabroski, seconded by Feldmann the Board entered into a closed session pursuant to Chapter 20.17(3) of the Code of Iowa for a collective bargaining strategy session.

At 6:34 p.m. the Board entered into open session.

The meeting adjourned at 6:35 p.m.

Kindergarten News

Even with all of the snow days, kindergarten is still moving full steam ahead! This time of year is very busy and one of the most exciting times as the students are have begun guided reading rotations during our literacy block. During this time students are in small groups of 3-4 and rotate through different centers where they work on sight words, handwriting, sentence writing, comprehension skills, decoding and different phonemic awareness skills. Students also spend time with their teacher reading out of leveled texts and working on vocabulary, fluency and comprehension. In math we are in the middle of a unit on addition and subtraction. Students are using a variety of manipulatives and strategies to learn how to join and decompose numbers. Another exciting thing that is taking place is that Kindergarten is that we are doing a unit on eggs and chicks with "Ag in the Classroom" through the Delaware County Farm Bureau. All three classrooms currently have incubators filled with eggs in them. We are learning all about how chicks grow and develop inside the egg and what the chicks will need to survive once they hatch. Our chicks will hopefully be hatching in about 2 weeks!



3rd Grade Update

In February third grade has been focusing on various reading trategies in guided reading groups with a strong emphasis on fluency. Students have excelled in their comprehension goals for Reading Counts! During math students are continuing to learn about the fact families of multiplication and working on fluently recalling the math facts that we have already learned in quarter 2. Our writing takes us into how to write a strong opinion piece, in which students are doing a fantastic job of structuring their writing as well as forming strong opinions and reasons to support their opinion. In science we are studying crayfish including their structures, adaptations, crayfish territories, and how they compare to other animals. In addition, we are learning about the Native Americans in social studies. Despite all of the crazy weather we had at the beginning of the month, we still managed to get in time to celebrate the 100th day of school and Valentine's Day!

5th Grade Social Studies

We have been learning about the original thirteen colonies and how other countries and culture groups came to take over the land. The students have completed multiple hands on activities to better understand life in the colonial days. This ultimately led to the Revolutionary War, which we will focus on for much of the fourth quarter. Also, we will be learning about the government at that time and how they wrote and voted on laws. This will lead into current society where we will connect our school, town, state and national government and how rules, practices and laws are formed. Students will be able to hear firsthand from some of these leaders to learn about their role in government. We are looking forward to a great rest of the year!

1ST GRADE CELEBRATES DAY 100









The 100th day of school is literally the 100th day of the school year. More importantly, it is a great way for students and teachers to celebrate the different math concepts that can be taught using the number 100. From the very first day of school, we begin keeping track of the number of days we've been in school in anticipation of the 100th day. This is actually the first math lesson, as the days are marked using popsicle sticks, ten of which become a "ten bundle," paving the way to counting by tens and ones. We make (add) and break (subtract) numbers each day as a part of calendar time.

In February, we were finally able to celebrate the 100th Day of School...on Valentine's Day! The first graders brought in collections of 100 things. The collections were counted and sorted many different ways. We had everything from pennies to legos to sucker bouquets. Throughout the day students built towers using toothpicks and 100 marshmallows, and pyramids using plastic cups. They also flipped a coin 100 times and rolled dice to get to 100. It was a fun and exciting day for everyone!

Change A Child's Story Update Report for 2018 Calendar Year

The mission for "Change A Child's Story" is to help improve literacy by getting books into the hands of children and reading with them. Our program is funded by donations, grants, fundraising events (bake sales), and collecting gently used books. Funds are used to purchase new books from Scholastic Book Clubs. We received two grants to be used this year. We received a grant in the spring for \$200 from Small Miracles funded through the Greater Delaware County Community Foundation. Later in the fall we received a grant for \$250 from Walmart Community Grants.

Programs benefiting from "Change A Child's Story" include:

- MV School District Volunteers reading with children in the elementary schools
- Books included in the MV Backpack Food Program
- Delhi Public Library books donated for use as incentives in special programs and activities at the library
- Angel Tree books given to children of incarcerated parents at Christmas
- Little Free Library in the Delhi City Park

Records show from January 2018 through December 2018 that 101 books were purchased for a total of \$322, and 2984 gently used books were donated. Donations of gently used books have increased due to increased publicity by newsletters, newspapers, social media, word of mouth, and local collection sites. All MV elementary classrooms preschool through 5th grade were visited, read to, and informed about the "Books For Kids" collection tubs placed in all the MV elementary centers. There has been a very positive response. Books in new condition and unmarked are used for book give a-ways and more gently used books are used in the Little Free Library box in the Delhi City Park. A total of 447 new books were given out for the 2018 calendar year. These numbers do not reflect the use of the Little Free Library in the Delhi City Park.

The Little Free Library was placed in the Delhi City Park in August 2016. The Little Free Library is stocked with books and magazines for children through adult. It runs on the idea, "Take a Book, Return a Book". This project has been well received by the community and gets a lot of use. Books are recorded as they go in and the Little Free Library is checked weekly noting books that go in and out. (It is checked less frequently in the winter months but is stocked year round). Books are cycled out if they sit for 4 weeks in a row and more books are cycled in.

Use of the Little Free Library January through December 2018:

- 976 books cycled in
- 407 books cycled out after sitting 4 weeks
- 445 children's books gone, 146 adult books gone
- 27 children's books returned, 15 adult books returned
- 113 books/magazines added by the community

Since the placing the Little Free Library in the Delhi City Park in August 2016:

- 430 adult books have been taken
- 991 children's books have been taken
- 358 books have been added by the community

Maquoketa Valley's Summer Driver Education Class



It is time to think about summer driver education at Maquoketa Valley. Information about the class:

1)The class is only held at the high school in Delhi. Greg Drew is the instructor for both the class and driving.

2)Classes will begin May 9th and will end around June 21st. Classes will be held from 7:00-8:00 am before the school year ends; after school ends classes will be from 8:30-10:30 am. A group will be assigned to drive after school each day until school ends; once school has ended numerous groups will be driving each day. A schedule will be mailed at the end of April with all classes/driving/and times listed.

3)Students must be 14 years of age by April 1st in order to take summer driver's education at Maquoketa Valley.

4)It is required by the State of Iowa, that each student will attend 30 hours of class and drive 6 hours.

5)An attempt is made to schedule students from the same town's together to drive, so carpooling may take place, but we can not guarantee this will happen. Also, if your child is in softball or baseball,youmust email pamoverman@maquoketa-v.k12.ia.us to try for the preferential driving times. These times are limited, so the sooner you let MV know the better chance of getting one of these driving times.



Biliteracy Seal opportunity for Graduating Seniors

Iowa has just been approved at the state legislature this past fall for the Seal of Biliteracy for graduating Seniors of 2019.

What is the Seal of Biliteracy?

The Seal of Biliteracy is an award given by a school, school district or county office of education in recognition of students who have studied and attained proficiency in two or more languages by high school graduation. The Seal of Biliteracy takes the form of a gold seal that appears on the transcript or diploma of the graduating senior and is a statement of accomplishment for future employers and for college admissions.

What is the purpose of the Biliteracy Seal?

The Biliteracy seal recognizes a student's high level of proficiency in speaking, listening, reading and writing in English and one or more languages. This demonstrates:

- Evidence for students, employers and universities of a student's readiness for career and college, and for engagement as a global citizen
- Award becomes part of a student's official high school transcript
- Recognition the value of language learning through Iowa Public Schools
- Recognition in graduation programs and Seal of Biliteracy medals or ribbons worn at graduation if eligibility is completed by April 26, 2019
- At Maquoketa Valley Students in Spanish IV will be taking this assessment in March 2019
 - Strengthen cross-cultural communication, affirm the value of diversity, and honor the multiple cultures and languages in our communities.

What do students have to do in order to receive this award?

Criteria:

- Students must obtain an ACT ENGLISH score of 18 or higher to prove their English proficiency AND
- Students must be currently enrolled in Spanish IV
- Students will take the STAMP Assessment in Spanish IV class. They must achieve a score of Intermediate Mid (5) or higher in all areas of Reading, Writing, Speaking, and Listening. *See Image

• What is STAMP?

• Avant STAMP (STAndards-based Measurement of Proficiency) 4S determines language proficiency in 4 domains (Reading, Writing, Listening and Speaking,) for grades 7-16. Avant STAMP 4S is web-based and computeradaptive, with real-world questions on topics selected to be level-appropriate based on research into topics taught at each level.

What is the cost of the Seal of Biliteracy?

No fee is charged to students to apply for a Seal of Biliteracy.
