Meet Millie



Maquoketa Valley's Future Therapy Dog

Research supports the use of therapy dogs in schools. Therapy dogs can lower stress levels in students and staff, reduce anxiety, increase positivity, help children learn social skills and help young readers gain confidence. Maquoketa Valley has taken many steps in helping our staff understand the social and emotional needs of our students. With the work the district has done in this area over the past several years, a great next step was to consider getting a therapy dog for our district.

My family adopted Millie and her brother, Cooper, a year ago this month. They are half Shih Tzu and half Bichon Frise. They are well mannered, non shedding dogs which only weigh between 15-20 pounds. My family adopted two dogs with the intention to train one of them to be a therapy dog that would be able to come to work with me each day to help our students. Last May, Millie and Cooper were seen by a dog trainer who recommended Millie as the better candidate to become a therapy dog based on her personality and confidence. With the help of a generous grant provided by the Maguoketa Valley Alliance. Millie was able to begin the first of her four classes in June. She completed her last class at the end of January and is currently studying to pass the test to become a certified therapy dog. Dogs must be at least one year old before taking this test. Since Millie just turned a year old in January, we are using this time to polish her skills before attempting the exam. Our target for testing is sometime in April.

Millie has had the opportunity to come to Delhi and Earlville Elementary with me for a few hours a day on a handful of occasions. This has allowed her to become comfortable with these new environments including the sounds of all the students, the loud bells, the variety of smells and the crowds of people she encounters. She has handled this well, she needs to continue to be exposed to the school environment. I will continue to introduce her to the common areas at school as we continue to practice her skills at home and other public places. The students and staff have loved having her at school! They often ask when she will get to come back and look forward to petting her and being able to give her a treat. I know once she is fully certified, she will benefit many of our students on a regular basis by being a reading buddy, a calming friend, and a listening ear for those that need her.

SCHOOL BOARD MINUTES

The regular meeting of the Maquoketa Valley Board of Education was called to order by President Donna Kunde at 5:30 p.m. in the High School Conference Room in Delhi, Iowa. All motions carried unanimously unless otherwise noted. Four board members were present. There were six staff and one visitor present. The agenda and consent items were approved.

Two open enrollment requests in and three open enrollment requests out were approved.

The Board tabled reviewing and approving board policies

The following personnel recommendations were approved:

Eric Conner – employed as High School Assistant Football Coach Margo Friedlein – resignation as Junior Kindergarten Teacher

Board Policy Series 200 were rescinded. The board then approved the updated Board Policy Series 200 on the first official reading.

The Board approved the call for garbage and trash collection bids.

A budget preparation workshop is scheduled for February 27th. Budget estimates will be discussed at the March meeting.

The 2021-2021 school calendar was discussed. Extra professional development time for the elementary staff was also discussed.

Supt. Tuetken shared projected elementary class sizes for the 2020-2021 school year. It appears that all classes will remain at three sections with the exception of fourth grade, which will have two sections.

The upcoming schedule for the Superintendent search meetings was discussed.

The district will not be seeking a food service RFP for the upcoming school year.

Supt. Tuetken discussed compensating the National Honor Society sponsor \$500 per year. Currently the sponsor for the program is a no paid position.

The regular March board meeting will be held on March 25th at 5:30. The April board meeting may be moved to April 13th in order for the SBO to certify the budget to the county by the deadline of April 15th. The April meeting date will be determined at the March meeting.

At 6:30 p.m. the Board entered into a closed session pursuant to Chapter 20.17(3) of the Code of Iowa for a collective bargaining strategy session.

At 6:52 p.m. the Board entered into open session.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:53 p.m. in a motion by Feldmann, seconded by Zietlow. All ayes. Carried.

Parent/Teacher Conferences

The dates for the second Parent-Teacher Conferences of this school year are **Tuesday**, **March 24** and **Thursday**, **March 26**, from 3 PM - 7 PM both evenings.

The 7th & 8th graders will also have scheduled fifteen minute conferences. Parents will be assigned to one of your child's teachers who will have all information about your child and their grades from their other classes and teachers. If you feel that you need to talk to any other teachers about your child, we will post conference schedules outside of each classroom. Therefore, if a teacher is not conferencing, feel free to talk with them. If this doesn't work we will be more than happy to have a staff member call you or set up a time to meet with you.

High School teachers will be set up in the High School gymnasium, and parents are invited to speak with any or all of their child's teachers at their convenience during the time allowed. High School report cards will be given to parents by the secretaries in the front foyer of the building. Any High School report cards not picked up during the conference times will be sent home with the students.



With winter and the cold weather upon us, we remind you that our building temperatures are set at 65 degrees. Parents are encouraged to dress your children appropriately. It is perfectly acceptable for your child to wear a sweater or sweatshirt in class in order to stay comfortable.

Kindergarten

This time of year is always a busy one for Kindergarten. We are currently in the middle of our math unit on addition and subtraction. The students use different kinds materials to learn how to join together and decompose numbers in all different ways. It is a fun unit for the students and they love the "big kid" feeling they get when they can add and subtract. We just ended a science unit titled "Animals 2x2." In this unit the students studied fish, worms, snails and pill bugs to learn what animals need to survive. The worms were by far their favorite animal! Guided reading groups and reading rotations are in full swing. During this time the students receive small group instruction from their teacher on reading strategies, sight words and sentence writing. They also get to read for enjoyment, listen to a story on the computer and work on sight words or simple decodable words with Mrs. Johnson during this time.

Third Grade News

The third grade classrooms have been filled with lots of fun learning.

In January, 3rd graders enjoyed a SuperBowl themed day of engaging learning activities. We practiced math with a concession stand and popcorn math facts. Students read about famous athletes to reinforce reading skills and we practiced our writing skills with football themed topics. The day also included a friendly reading competition between the third grade classrooms.

In math, we are learning about fractions through hands-on discovery and drawing math models to represent fractional units. Students are also practicing their math skills with the help of a fun online math program called Zearn.

We just finished our life Science unit which included a study of crayfish, the life cycle of plants, and the skeletal system.



Kindergarten, 3rd & 4th Grade Title Reading News

As parents, you might wonder how does a Kindergarten Title reading teacher help my child?

For starters, there is a great deal of communication between the classroom teachers and myself. We look at lots of different types of data, including observations made within the classroom. We collaborate as a team and look for skill patterns our students are struggling with and intervene with research-based activities to improve the predetermined skill deficit.

The literacy skill we have focused on since the beginning of the year is letter recognition and letter sounds, while supporting our Jolly Phonics curriculum. We've also practiced sight words and high frequency words in isolation and also within the text.

Recently our kindergarteners have begun segmenting sounds within words to blend together and READ!! It is simply amazing how these little Wildcats have learned and caught onto the skills of reading and are truly enjoying their new adventures as kindergarteners!

**One way to help your kindergartener at home is to read out loud to your child and continue to practice the Literacy bag activities that are sent home from the kindergarten teachers.

Third & Fourth grade Title reading students have been putting forth 100% effort in their daily lessons as they continue on their path as R.E.A.L. Readers!

You might wonder what it means to be a R.E.A.L. Reader? A R.E.A.L. Reader focuses on their <u>Rate</u>, <u>Expression</u>, <u>Accuracy and Learning</u> as they read. The following graphic is displayed in our Title reading room and in their classrooms.

Our 3rd & 4th grade Wildcats came back from winter break eager to set some reading goals for 2020! The goals we came up with together are:

- *Tracking where I'm reading with my eyes, finger, or a bookmark.
- *Reading through the whole word. Does it look right, sound right, or make sense?
- *Pay attention to punctuation as I read!
- *Stay focused...TUNE-IN to reading!
- *Smooth reading...Not too fast, Not too slow, Just right!
- *Be a careful & quick reader!
- *Re-Read if the text does not make sense!
- *STOP, THINK, & WONDER before turning the page!

The week of January 13th began our winter FAST screening. The students have shown growth in the areas of fluency, accuracy, and comprehension since their previous screening last fall. All their hard work in the classroom and reading at home has shown positive growth in all 3 of these areas. Our teachers and myself are very proud of our student's hard work, dedication, and perseverance the 1st semester of school. Keep up the GREAT work Wildcats!









The 100th day of school is literally the 100th day of the school year. More importantly it is a great way for students and teachers to celebrate the different math concepts that can be taught using the number 100. From the very first day of school, we begin keeping track of the number of days we've been in school in anticipation of the 100th day. This is actually the first math lesson, as the days are marked using popsicle sticks, ten of which becomea "ten bundle", paving the way to counting by tens and ones. We make (add) and break (subtract) numbers each day as a part of calendar time.

Early in February, we were able to celebrate the 100th Day of School. The first graders brought in collections of 100 things. The collections were counted and sorted many different ways. We had everything from pennies to legos to sucker bouquets. Throughout the day students built towers using toothpicks and 100 marshmallows, and pyramids using plastic cups. They also flipped a coin 100 times and rolled dice to get to 100. It was a fun and exciting day for everyone!

2020 Maquoketa Valley Summer Driver's Education

It is time to think about summer driver education at Maquoketa Valley. Information about the class:

- 1)The class is only held at the high school in Delhi. Greg Drew is the instructor for both the class and driving.
- 2)Classes will begin May 14th and will end around June 21st. Classes will be held from 7:00-8:00 am before the school year ends; after school ends classes will be from 8:30-10:30 am. A group will be assigned to drive after school each day until school ends; once school has ended numerous groups will be driving each day. A schedule will be mailed at the end of April with all classes/driving/and times listed.
- 3)Students must be 14 years of age by April 1st in order to take summer driver's education at Maquoketa Valley.
- 4)It is required by the State of Iowa, that each student will attend 30 hours of class and drive 6 hours.
- 5)An attempt is made to schedule students from the same town's together to drive, so carpooling may take place, but we can not guarantee this will happen. Also, if your child is in softball or baseball, you must email gregdrew@maquoketa-v.k12.ia.us to try for the preferential driving times. Biliteracy Seal opportunity for Graduating Seniors

Iowa has just approved at the state legislature this fall 2019 for the Seal of Biliteracy for graduating Seniors of 2020.

What is the Seal of Biliteracy?

The Seal of Biliteracy is an award given by a school, school district or county office of education in recognition of students who have studied and attained proficiency in two or more languages by high school graduation. The Seal of Biliteracy takes the form of a gold seal that appears on the transcript or diploma of the graduating senior and is a statement of accomplishment for future employers and for college admissions.

What is the purpose of the Biliteracy Seal?

The Biliteracy seal recognizes a student's high level of proficiency in speaking, listening, reading and writing in English and one or more languages. This demonstrates:

- Evidence for students, employers and universities of a student's readiness for career and college, and for engagement as a global citizen
- Award becomes part of a student's official high school transcript
- Recognition the value of language learning through Iowa Public Schools
- Recognition in graduation programs and Seal of Biliteracy medals or ribbons worn at graduation if eligibility is completed by April 26, 2020.
- At Maquoketa Valley Students in Spanish IV will be taking this assessment in March 2020.
 - Strengthen cross-cultural communication, affirm the value of diversity, and honor the multiple cultures and languages in our communities.

What do students have to do in order to receive this award?

Criteria:

- Students must obtain an ACT ENGLISH score of 18 or higher to prove their English proficiency AND
- Students must be currently enrolled in Spanish IV
- Students will take the STAMP Assessment in Spanish IV class. They must achieve a score of Intermediate Mid (5) or higher in all areas of Reading, Writing, Speaking, and Listening. *See Image

• What is STAMP?

 Avant STAMP (STAndards-based Measurement of Proficiency) 4S determines language proficiency in 4 domains (Reading, Writing, Listening and Speaking,) for grades 7-16. Avant STAMP 4S is web-based and computeradaptive, with real-world questions on topics selected to be level-appropriate based on research into topics taught at each level.

What is the cost of the Seal of Biliteracy?

No fee is charged to students to apply for a Seal of Biliteracy.
