

Four MV artists receive nods at conference art fair


Art is very much alive during this pandemic as four Wildcats placed at the Tri Rivers Conference ART Show that was held virtually this year.

Winners include:


Matthew Brehm with his photomontage received an Honorable Mention in the Design category;

Anne Deutmeyer with her pen and ink received 1st place in the Ink category.











In the shot put, Erin Knipper had a great night, consistently throwing in the 30s, but rattling off a monster of a throw of 33' 08". Taya Tucker had a nice night in the long jump, making finals and finishing with a careerbest 15' jump."



Molly: Maya. Definitely Maya Amaya: I do. It's me.


What's your favorite quality about the
