### Why Children and Teens are Particularly Sensitive to the Sleep-disrupted Impact of Electronics

With their brains, sleep patterns, and eyes still developing, children and adolescents are particularly vulnerable to the sleep-disrupting effects of screen time, according to a sweeping review of the literature published today in the journal *Pediatrics*.

"The vast majority of studies find that kids and teens who consume more screen-based media are more likely to experience sleep disruption, Associate Professor at the U of Colorado Boulder, Monique LeBourgeois, further explains the reasons *why* digital media adversely affects sleep."

 More screen time is associated with delayed bedtimes, fewer hours of sleep and poorer sleep quality.

Biological, neurological and environmental factors all play a role:

- Because children's eyes are not fully developed, children are more sensitive than adults to the impact of light on the internal body clock.
- Light is our brain clock's primary timekeeper. Meaning when light hits the retina in the eye in the evening hours it suppresses the sleep-promoting hormone melatonin, delaying sleepiness and pushing back the timing of the body clock. Younger individuals have larger pupils, and their lenses are more transparent, so their exposure and sensitivity to that light is even greater than in older individuals.
- One study found that when adults and school-aged children were exposed to the same amount and intensity of light, the children's melatonin levels fell twice as much.
- Studies also show that short-wavelength "blue light" in hand-held electronics -- is particularly potent at suppressing melatonin.
- Through the eyes of a child, exposure to a bright blue screen in the hours before bedtime is the perfect storm for both sleep and circadian disruption.

### Psychological Stimulation factors:

 Whether it's exposure to violent media or texting with friends -- either can also sabotage sleep by boosting cognitive arousal.

### Recommendations for Parents:

- Limit children's media use in the hour before bedtime.
- Turn off all electronic media devices, including yours, at bedtime, and charge them in a central location outside bedrooms.
- Remove all electronic media from your child or teen's bedroom, including TV's, video games, computers, tablets, and cell phones.
- Stick to a sleep schedule and avoid caffeine in the evening.

Sleep Recommendations for Children and Teens from The American Academy of Sleep Medicine, endorsed by the American Academy of Pediatrics:

- Preschoolers (3-5) should sleep 10 to 13 hours per 24 hours (including naps) on a regular basis to promote optimal health
- Children 6 to 12 years of age should sleep 9 to 12 hours per 24 hours on a regular basis to promote optimal health.
- Teenagers 13 to 18 years of age should sleep 8 to 10 hours per 24 hours on a regular basis to promote optimal health.

As the Delhi third graders near the end of the school year, they can be proud of their hard work and dedication this school year!


In math 3rd quarter, students worked on understanding that fractions are equal parts of a whole, relating fractions and whole numbers and comparing and ordering fractions. In order to deepen students' understanding of fractions they used manipulatives and a variety of strategies.



Our approach to reading encourages students to learn and apply new strategies in order to deepen their understanding of what's being read. We're learning how to connect text with our own experiences, as well as other texts we've read. We've also been discovering how making predictions, questioning, visualizing, inferring, drawing conclusions and summarizing can enhance our understanding of the stories we read. The students are also focusing on crafting well constructed written responses to what they're reading; using evidence from the text to support their thinking. We've already seen a lot of growth in the area of writing!

Science class 4th quarter has found the 3rd graders exploring water and climate with the use of the FOSS kit from Keystone. The FOSS kits are designed around active investigations that provide engagement with science concepts and science engineering practices. The investigations in this unit are Water Observations, Hot Water, Cold Water, Weather and Water, Seasons and Climate and Waterworks. At the end of the unit students will be designing, constructing, evaluating and redesigning a waterwheel to lift or pull objects!

It's been a busy and exciting 2nd semester in 3rd grade!

- 1)The class is held in Delhi at the high school.

### Maquoketa Valley Community Garden

At the beginning of the 2018-2019 school year, Maquoketa Valley Ag Classes, MV FFA and the Delhi United Methodist Youth Group joined forced to provide a Community Garden for the Maquoketa Valley Community. The goal of these groups decided there was a need for free fresh produce in the community.

According to the Census Bureau in 2017 Delaware County's median household income was \$60,534, which is greater than the state of lowa's median household income at \$56,570. Even though our county has a higher income than state's income, there are still families going hungry.

Delaware County covers 579 square miles and is the home of 17,153 people as of 2017. Feedingamerica.org states 9.3% of people in Delaware County are struggling with food insecurity. In our county alone there are 1,610 people are hungry and have no food.

In the fall, ground was broke at 506 Market St. in Delhi. The Youth Group built a storage shed and helped remove the sod from the new garden plot. The MV Ag classes put up a fence around the garden, took soil samples and tested for soil health, and built a vegetable stand and an information kiosk. They also started vegetables, herbs, ornamental corn and a few flowers in the greenhouse. The vegetables are ready to be transplanted as soon as Mother Nature cooperates.

Donations are not expected but will be accepted. These donations will be used for supplies for the garden next year.



### **SCHOLASTIC BOOK FAIR**

The Scholastic Book Fair visited Maguoketa Valley on March 12 & March 14 during Spring Conferences in Delhi, but the excitement didn't start there. Students spent the days prior to the Book Fair creating Wish Lists, previewing the Book Fair, and participating in a Pre-8 Coin War. The hallways were buzzing with an eagerness to earn some new books for our district classrooms and libraries. The Coin War winners also earned special prizes throughout the week. The competition got fierce as each Pre-5 classroom was eager to win privileges such as lunch in the classroom, extra recess, and other incentives. The elementary students (Pre-5) in all buildings (Delhi, Johnston, Earlville) were able to raise \$2,778.90 to purchase new books for their classrooms. The Middle School students (grades 6-8) got excited about a separate bank of prizes: Free WIN, Egg Roulette, Relay Race Games, and Free Study Halls. For every \$25 earned per grade, the students would cash in on another incentive. The Middle School students were able to raise \$308.42 to purchase new books for their ELA classrooms.
