How does a Students Involvement in Extracurricular Activities

Lead to Academic Success and a Gain in Employability Skills?

Much has been made in recent years over what can be done at the local, state, and national levels to increase the performance of our students in the classroom. Make no mistake about it, there have been, are currently, and will continue to be many strategies implemented in an attempt to boost classroom performance.

At Maquoketa Valley we continue to work to make the curriculum and content taught relevant and engaging to students. We have developed a High School course catalog with career pathways and links to post-secondary education & training, as well as links to employer information in this course catalog. Governor Reynolds Future Ready Iowa Initiative focuses on providing students the opportunity to receive education and training in career pathways in their interest area. At Maquoketa Valley we are currently providing students these opportunities through job shadows and the NICC career learning link, partnerships with local community colleges where students can get training and earn certificates that can be presented to employers, our CTE programs taught within our district where students learn employability skills in the areas of Business, Industrial Technology, Family & Consumer Science, and Agricultural Education, we include an employability skills report as part of the students report card at the end of each quarter, and our school to work program that provides students the opportunity to experience real-world experiences through visits to a variety of businesses, career fairs, and speakers in the area. However, one strategy often overlooked is the connection between academic success, and a student's involvement in extracurricular activities.

Studies at the state and national level are indicating there is indeed a strong correlation between the grade point average and student involvement in extracurricular activities. Studies show that those students who are in extracurricular activities, do the best in school and learn valuable life-long lessons.

How does a Students Involvement in Extracurricular Activities

Lead to Academic Success and a Gain in Employability Skills?

There are several reasons why students involved in extracurricular activities perform better academically, and gain valuable employability skills, including:

• **Students are better "connected" to school.** These students often take great pride in their school and their performance in the classroom as well as on the athletic field or stage.

• Students are put in other situations where they are with and taught by caring, supporting educators. Coaches and sponsors make strong connections with students – they help monitor attendance, behavior, grades and serve as additional mentors that often help students with personal skills, employability skills, as well as academic issues.

• Students involved in activities show a much higher record of attendance than those who do not participate. When students have more connection at school they will attend more frequently.

• Activities teach and stress to students a number of life long skills such as a strong work ethic, responsibility to teammates or others, goal setting, time management and prioritizing, and how to deal with adversity. These are skills that are unquestionably vital to the success of any person in the real world.

• Leadership Roles. Students are asked to take on leadership roles in their extracurricular activities. The learning that occurs in these roles is critical to success beyond High School.

Finally, this information does not just speak to the importance of student involvement in activities at the high school level. Rather, it is important to understand that involvement in school activities must be fostered and encouraged throughout a student's K-12 education. If we wait until the start of high school to stress the importance of involvement in extracurricular activities the opportunity might well be lost. I encourage all of us, parents, educators, and community members to continue to impress on our students the importance of becoming and staying involved in extracurricular activities.

SCHOOL BOARD MINUTES

October 21, 2019

The Board held the hearing on the proposed Resolution to Consider Continued Participation in the Instructional Support Program. In a motion by Kunde, seconded by Feldmann the following resolution was passed:

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors has determined that to continue the current level of services and to fund the ongoing programs of the School District, continuation of participation in the Instructional Support

Program for a period of five years is necessary and in the best interests of the District and its residents and students; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors has given consideration to continue participation in the Instructional Support Program as provided in Sections 257.18 through 257.21, Code of Iowa; and

WHEREAS, the Board has published notice of the time and place of a public hearing on the Resolution; and

WHEREAS, a hearing has been held upon the proposal to continue participation in the Instructional Support Program and any objections are overruled:

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS RESOLVED: The Board of Directors determines that it is consistent with the five-year finance plan to fund the ongoing programs and services of the School District and it is in the best interest of the School District to continue participation in an Instructional Support Program as provided in Sections 257.18 through 257.21, Code of Iowa, and to provide additional funding therefor for a period of five (5) years commencing with the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022.

The additional funding for the Instructional Support Program for a budget year will be determined annually and will not exceed ten percent(10%) of the total regular program district cost for the budget year and moneys received under Section 257.14, Code of Iowa, as a budget adjustment for the budget year.

Moneys received by the District for the Instructional Support Program may be used for any general fund purpose.

The Instructional Support Program will be funded by instructional support state aid and an instructional support property tax levied annually upon the taxable property within the School District.

Unless, within twenty-eight days following the adoption of this Resolution, the Secretary of the Board receives a petition containing the signatures of eligible electors equal in number to not less than one hundred or thirty percent of the number of voters at the last preceding regular school election, whichever is greater, asking that an election be called to approve or disapprove this action of the Board adopting the Instructional Support Program, this action of the Board is final and the Secretary is authorized and directed to certify a copy of this Resolution to the Department of Management. In the event a petition containing the required number of signatures is filed with the Secretary of the Board within twenty-eight days of the adoption of this Resolution, the President shall call a meeting of the Board to consider rescission of this Resolution, or to direct the county commissioner of elections to submit the following question to the qualified electors of the School District at a special election. If the Board determines to submit the question to the electors, the proposition to be submitted shall be as follows: Shall the Board of Directors of the Maquoketa Valley Community School District, in the County of Delaware, State of Iowa, be authorized for a period of five (5) years to levy annually, as determined by the Board, an instructional support property tax in an amount (after taking into consideration instructional support state aid) not to exceed ten percent (10%) of the total of regular program district cost for the budget year and moneys received under Section 257.14, Code of Iowa, as a budget adjustment in the budget year, to be levied upon the taxable property within the School District, commencing with the levy for collection in the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022, to be used for any general fund purpose.

A roll call vote was answered as follows: Dabroski, Feldmann, Huber, Kunde, Zietlow; all ayes. Carried.

SCHOOL BOARD MINUTES

October 21, 2019

The Board held the hearing for an early start date for the 2020-2021 school year. Following discussion, the Board authorized the submission of a request to begin our 2020-2021 school year as early as allowed by law.

The regular meeting of the Maquoketa Valley Board of Education was called to order by President John Zietlow at 5:45 p.m. at Earlville Elementary in Earlville, Iowa. All motions carried unanimously unless otherwise noted. Five board members were present. There were five staff members and five visitors. The agenda and consent items were approved.

Nate Whited, from Fusion Forward, gave a brief presentation on the promotional video he created for Dollars for Scholars.

The following personnel recommendations were approved: Erika Imler – employed as Prom Sponsor Ali Sheehy – resignation as Assistant Softball Coach

Three open enrollment requests out were approved.

The Board will meet jointly with the North Linn School Board on December 16th and the area Representatives for a legislative session.

Enrollment for the 2019-2020 school year was certified on October 15th. It appears the district will see a decrease in enrollment of roughly 17 students. However, open enrolled students out decreased and open enrollment students in increased. This is a positive factor in overall enrollment.

Board policy 800 series will be reviewed in November and the series 900 and 1000 will reviewed in December and January. Supt. Tuetken also shared information regarding aligning the district policy numbers to IASB policy numbers.

Supt. Tuetken will bring an updated Early Separation package to the board in November for approval.

Supt. Tuetken took few minutes to discuss the initial comments from the FY19 district audit which was complete in October.

Supt. Tuetken took a few minutes to update the Board on the positive comments received from MFL parents and fans the evening of the Homecoming football game. He commended the students and staff on their actions.

The November meeting will be held in Earlville.

Wildcat Way- Bus Expectations

The Wildcat Way has been an effective tool to help students learn about being respectful, responsible, and safe in many areas of the school. The Wildcat Way also addresses expectations for all students riding our buses. Being respectful on the buses means students are greeting the bus driver, using kind and appropriate language, and a voice level that allows the driver to focus on the main job of driving. Students also need to respect other's personal space and property. Students demonstrate responsibility by listening to and following directions, keeping track of their personal items, and going directly to their destination after exiting the bus. Students' behavior also effects their safety. Students can be safe by getting on and off the bus carefully, one student at a time. They also need to stay seated (back to back, seat to seat, feet on the floor) and keep their hands and feet to themselves. If students follow these expectations, everyone will have a pleasant bus ride to and from school. One additional procedure in place is we have our youngest students sit in the front of the bus, followed by our early elementary students, and then our upper elementary students. Our middle schoolers and high schoolers sit in the back of the bus. By using this seating arrangement, our students are interacting with students of the same age which is appropriate for them. We all want riding the bus to be a positive experience for everyone involved. If we follow the Wildcat Way, this will be achieved.

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D.A.R.E. Returns to Fifth Grade

For the third year, Fifth Graders are again participating in the D.A.R.E. program at school. On ten consecutive Mondays, Deputy Matt Menard from the Delaware County Sheriff's Department works with the Fifth Graders to learn important life lessons. Although D.A.R.E. stands for "Drug Abuse Resistance Education," the program is about much more than avoiding drugs and alcohol.

In each of the weekly lessons, students discuss how to apply the Dare Decision Making Model (a.k.a. DDMM) to real-life situations. The Dare Decision Making Model helps students to: define a problem, assess possible choices, consider positive and negative consequences, respond with an informed choice, and evaluate their decision.

This model helps them learn ways to make responsible choices, to respond to peer pressure and other stressful situations, to handle bullying situations, and to seek adult help using confident communication. Deputy Menard's 50-minute lessons keep the students engaged in thoughtful discussions. In December, when the weekly lessons are over, a brief "graduation" ceremony will be held to recognize the growth students have made. We are grateful to Deputy Menard and the Sheriff's department for sponsoring this program for our students!



News from Mrs. Orr's 2nd Grade Classroom

The first quarter of school has been verv busv! Second grade students have learned how to read and identify all parts of a story's structure in Reading. We have also been working on becoming more fluent readers. In Science, we have studied solids, liquids and gases. Our students spent time using solid objects to build tall towers. We even got to taste six different liquids and describe their properties! In Math, we have learned how to measure objects with rulers, practice addition and subtraction facts, and are now diving into three-digit numbers. Some of our most fun math lessons have included building three-digit numbers with Cheese-its, pretzel sticks, and M&Ms, and using one-dollar bills and ten-dollar bills to create three-digit numbers. Our year is off to a great start!
