

CTE collaboration leads to holiday cheer



Delaware County has become a bit brighter at night and students have gained some valuable experience in metal fabrication, electricity and fundraising.

The metal fabrication class has been working endlessly on a project in which they designed a holiday light display. Mr. Palmer stated they chose this project as a class as a way of giving back to the community and also allowing the same class years down the road to build onto the display year after year.

This project was a collaboration with the Emerging Technology Trends class as the students there helped raise funds for the project. The Electricity 1 class helped put on the lights and the Metal Fabrication students got donations from local companies to help with the project. Mr. Palmer claimed there is close to \$1000 in the display when combining all the donations.

"Ms. Lau and I are so proud of the students' commitment to this project," Mr. Palmer stated. "Students not only worked on it during class but before and after school, on the weekends, and even on Nov. 5 when we had no school. The project went from being smaller into a huge display."

To create this 10 feet tall and 20 feet long display, the students had to figure out how to fabricate/design it so it could

collapse down into no larger than 5 feet sections for storage purposes.

"I challenged the students to think outside of the box and to not have it look like a typical Christmas theme," Mr. Palmer state. "They took different designs and molded them into one display. They ended up with The Cat Coaster, with a Christmasthemed jack o lantern.

The project is currently displayed in Manchester at the fairgrounds.

The women's basketball team for the Hawks took a long hiatus due to Covid protocol, but now they are back on the court! Led by Caitlin Clark, the #12 Hawks fell to Duke on December 2nd but came back for a strong win on the 5th by taking down Big Ten opponent Michigan State. This Wednesday they played their own Cy-Hawk game in Ames and lost 70-77 to a #17 Iowa State team. Don't worry, they have roughly a week to prepare for their next game against UCF.

The Iowa State men's basketball team has been on a roll with new head coach T.J. Otzelberger. They are heading into the Cy-Hawk game 8-0 after a season of already taking down a #9 Memphis team and a Xavier team that had beaten an Ohio State team. This Sunday they take on Jackson State in Ames.

The ISU women's team is also having a

great season so far having gone into the Cy-Hawk game 8-1, losing to a strong LSU team in a close game, and leaving with another dub to add to their list. Led by Ashley Joens, the team secured their first win over the Hawkeyes since 2015. That

For rebounds, Trenkamp had seven and Hoeger and Cook had six. Deutmeyer had four, McShane had three, Holtz had two, and Toby Grimm had one. Four assists were made by Deutmeyer, and Holtz, Trenkamp, and Hoeger each had one assist.

The next game was Dec. 6 against Central Elkader. The boys kept their streak with a win 46 to 26.

Top scorers were Holtz with 12, Trenkamp with 11, and Hoeger and Deutmeyer with eight each. McShane scored three, and Grimm and Brock Daack scored two each.



Abstractions

by Matthew Brehm Picture this: You're strolling down the famous Hollywood Boulevard in Los Angeles at sunset. The storefronts are emblazoned with neon signs that draw in swarms of



tourists like flies to a light. The sidewalk under your feet is paved with the names of celebrities and palm trees line the street.

But wait—why are there palm trees here? It is true that California has one native palm. However, these plants are generally seen in tropical climates, such as ones found in Africa and southern Asia—a far cry from the dry Mediterranean climate of southern California. Nonetheless, the palm tree has come to represent cities like L.A. and San Diego. This situation highlights a sociological phenomenon that I find very interesting.

In 1769, Spanish missionaries brought date palm trees with them from northern Africa to California upon their arrival, and many believe they did it for religious reasons. The palms had biblical ties, and they didn't look half bad either.

It wouldn't be until over 150 years later that the palms residing in southern California would begin drawing the attention of foreigners. Europeans connected the trees to the relaxing beaches of the Mediterranean and the region became famous as a vacation destination. In preparation for the 1932 Olympics, tens of thousands of palm trees were planted in L.A. to make the city more appealing. Today, that city is home to over ten million of these trees.

The work of a small number of Spanish missionaries led to one of the largest landscaping endeavors in history, completely redefining southern California as we know it today. In the first issue of the Wildcat Echo this year, I wrote about how pizza became an American staple. This story is one that I feel highlights a similar piece of humanity: the need to take a bit of our culture with us.

Something I neglected to mention, however, is that California also has palms from Asia, Australia, and Mexico. The implantation of this species was a group effort, created by travelers across the globe.

While palm trees may be hard to come by here in Iowa, what they symbolize is something that can be appreciated around the world.
