Abstractions

This week, I thought I might take a shot at interpreting a quote I found in *A Gentleman in Moscow*, by Amor Towles: "The only difference between everybody and nobody is all the shoes."



For some context: a young girl laments to a man about how she will soon be starting school, and he recounts how much he loved school. She comments that everyone has been saying that same thing, to which the man states that it then must be true. This quote is her response.

This line can be interpreted in a number of ways, but given the context of the quote, it appears as a social commentary on groupthought, conformity, censorship, and other themes relating to society.

Clearly the girl is conveying a preference for diversity of thought. It's hard to disagree with that value. After all, without having a variety of opinions and values to assess, how can any of us determine where we fit into the larger puzzle of society? If we are consistently exposed to one singular opinion, we are learning nothing new at all about ourselves or the world around us. We need contrasting views if we are to adopt new perspectives.

Or, perhaps we can infer that she means it's better to listen to no one than it is to listen to everyone (provided that everyone shares the same opinion). This view deduces that we would do best to question everything, especially beliefs held by large groups of people. Through testing what we think we know rather than placing full trust in the words of others, we can formulate unique points of view.

Historically, our society has been constructed in a way that has propelled some voices to the forefront and silenced others. It wasn't until the latter part of the twentieth century that those repressed perspectives began receiving credit for their intellect and accomplishments.

Let us not become simply a collection of shoes. Let us have varying opinions and share them. Only by collaborating with one another and giving others the chance to speak can we reach strong conclusions. We can all learn something from those around us.
