




this year are Baby Doll and illusion. While researching I also saw a lot of feathers. I'm not sure how to feel about that one... I hope this helped!


What's your favorite memory created together?

Abstractions

Sometimes, the most basic of things can be the most interesting to analyze. That happened to be the case when my mind wandered to something we're surrounded by every day: paint.



Though it doesn't seem complex on the surface, paint and its usage is something that has helped to define human culture as it is today. It has saved lives and it has taken them. It has been a vehicle for change as well as one for oppression.

In a rural area of southwestern France, 1940, an 18-year-old was walking his dog when he discovered a cave. Upon exploring it, he and some friends uncovered the Lascaux paintings—17,000year-old paintings depicting hundreds of ambiguous symbols and animals, as well as hundreds more hand prints. What's interesting is that this type of art is not unique. It's been found across the planet, but it often looks very similar. Perhaps there is an intrinsic human need to create art—or simply to create.

Though they can be quite an annoyance at times, I enjoy scanning train cars as they scroll past at railroad crossings. The graffiti embellished on the cars have creators, and those creators have messages. I don't know where the cars come from, but I know that they are marked with the autobiographies of countless souls; souls that need to be free; souls that travel the country.

China's one-child policy, which was in effect from 1980 to 2016, is still vividly remembered by many today in the form of residual propaganda. Murals depicting a mother, father, and single child are common in urban Chinese streets. These paintings, often accompanied by the words, "ONE CHILD IS BEST," are just one harsh example of the way paintings have been used to push agendas.

But just as easily as paint decorates a surface, it can also be used to cover up. In September, the Taliban took to painting over a number of murals that displayed messages of freedom and questioned government power structures. Afghanis felt a piece of their culture—a piece of their identity—violently ripped from their hands, only to be replaced with propaganda.

Our usage of paint speaks volumes, whether it adds to our beauty or works to our detriment.

"That complicated relationship between art and its viewers is never more fraught than when we are looking deeply into the past." - John Green
