On the offensive end, Kiera Leytem led in assists(43). Haley Ronnebaum led in kills(11), followed by Grace Richter and Leah Reicher with 9 each. Defensively, Lili Bauers led in digs(33), followed by Jada Knipper(19), and Binaka Ronnebaum(15). Leytem led in serving going 27/28 with 3 Aces.

This Monday night, the team took on the Starmont Stars at home and won big by a score of 3-0 (25-20, 11-25, 23-25).

"The girls' chemistry really came together on the court," stated Coach De-Grott. "Communication was at an all time high. We did well to adjust to hits and continue to swing at them. I'm very proud of how they came off a tough 5 set loss to Ed-Co Thursday and turned it around Monday to get a win."

Several runners run personal bests in recent meets

As the cross country team moves into the second half of its season, several runners are seeing some of their best times yet. Just compare the times from the Anamosa meet to the Jesup meet.

On Saturday, Sept. 26, the MV cross Country team traveled to Anamosa to compete with 18 other schools.

The varsity boys finished ninth out of the 15-team field. Matthew Schaul placed 14th with a time of 18:01, George Livingston placed 24th with a time of 18:29, and Arion Rave placed 33rd with a time of 18:47. Toby Grimm placed 82nd with a time of 21:09, Kenyon Baker placed 84th with a time of 21:11, and Brady Eike placed 91st with a time of 22:07.

In the girls varsity race, Taryn Burbridge finished 9th in 21:07, and Isabel Imler finished 44th in 23:49. McKenna Bush and Allison Hogan completed in the JV race and ran 28:29 and 29:52, respectively.

Coach Meehan also mentioned that Audra Burbridge won the Middle School girls race. Taryn Burbridge was an individual medal winner in the Girls varsity race, and Matthew Schaul accomplished the same feat in the Boys Varsity race.

Their next meet took place in Jesup on Tuesday, Sept. 27.

For the girls varsity team, Burbridge ran a 20:20 for 12th place, and Imler ran a 22:54.9, placing 74th. In the JV race,

The boys varsity team included Schaul, running a 17:17.2, placing 11th; Livingston, running a 17:55.6, placing 30th; Rave, running a 18:35.7, placing 58th; Grimm, running a 20:09.6, placing 116th; Baker, running a 20:45.8, placing 134th; and Eike, running a 21:00.0, placing 139th. The team finished 11th out of 24 teams.


