School to Work Preparing Students for Life after High School

Every parent wants their kids to be successful. As parents, we want them to be successful in school, extra-curricular activities, and eventually their career. Our staff at Maquoketa Valley is dedicated to providing a high quality education to ensure success for all students. At Maquoketa Valley our staff works diligently to achieve our mission, which is: "Maquoketa Valley Community School District ensures high levels of learning to empower all students for lifelong success."

At Maquoketa Valley we provides students with School to Work opportunities to help students make educated decisions on their post-secondary plans. These plans for students may include entering the workforce, an apprenticeship, enrolling in a trade school, or enrolling in a 2-year or 4-year school. These can be really tough decisions for students. What opportunities do we provide students at Maquoketa Valley to help students with making decisions about their post-secondary plans?

- 1. Academics & Course Offerings Middle School & High School Students are provided the opportunity to learn about a variety of careers through the courses offered at Maquoketa Valley. Middle School students take a Careers course, and a variety of exploratory courses that provide students the opportunity to learn about different careers. In the High School we have offer a wide range courses that allow students the opportunity to learn about the skills and content necessary to be successful in a variety of careers. Teachers incorporate speakers into their curriculum to provide students with opportunities to learn about careers in their content area. We continue to provide a strong core curriculum that teaches students the skills necessary to be successful in career paths of their interest.
- **2.Career Fairs** In the Middle School and High School we provide students opportunities to participate in career fairs. These events give students and employers a chance to meet one another, establish professional relationships, and discuss potential job and/or internship opportunities. During this time students are also able to learn about the education requirements, salary, and type of skills needed to be successful in that career.
- **3. School to Work Events through the Delaware County School to Work Committee** High School students are provided a wide variety of opportunities to learn about careers of interest. Some examples include: Delaware County Healthcare Day, Brooks Harper Presentation on Employability Skills, Advanced Manufacturing Day, Business & Industry Day, and the Real Life Academy. Through these opportunities, students are able to see careers and opportunities first hand, and speak to professionals in these careers about any questions they may about these careers.

4. Motion was made by Zietlow, seconded by Feldmann to approve the meeting agenda as presented. All ayes. Carried.

Motion was made by Zietlow, seconded by Dabroski to approve the consent items. All ayes. Carried.

Keith Kramer, Maquoketa Valley Dollars for Scholars Board President, gave a brief presentation on the Dollars for Scholars program.

One open enrollment request out and two open enrollment requests in were approved in a motion by Feldmann, seconded by Overman. All ayes. Carried.

The following personnel recommendations were approved in a motion by Zietlow, seconded by Feldmann:

Patty Wilson – resignation as Food Service

All ayes. Carried.

Language changes to the following Board Policies were reviewed: 402.2 Child Abuse Reporting, 401.4 Employee Expression, 408.1 Licensed Employee Professional Development, 602.1 Curriculum Development, 602.2 Curriculum Implementation, 605.1 Instructional Materials Selection, 605.1R1 Selection of Instructional Materials, 605.2 Instruction and Library Materials Inspection, 605.3R1 Objection of Instructional and Library Materials, 605.3E2 Reconsideration of Instructional and Library Materials Request Form, 605.3E4 Request to Prohibit a Student from Checking Out Specific Library Materials and 802.4 Capital Assets. In a motion by Feldmann, seconded by Dabroski the Board approved these on the first official reading. All ayes. Carried.

In a motion by Dabroski, seconded by Overman the Board approved the 22-23 HACAP Food Service Agreement. All ayes. Carried.

In a motion by Feldmann, seconded by Zietlow the Board approved the out-of-state travel request from Miss Lau in conjunction with her travel to the National FFA Convention. All ayes. Carried.

The Board discussed possible sharing arrangements for the 20223-2024 school year. Further discussion will take place in November.

Supt. Hoeger updated the Board on upcoming building projects. OPN Architects visited the Delhi and Earlville campus to discuss bleacher replacement and playground updates.

Enrollment for the 2022-2023 school year was certified on October 15th. It appears the district will see a decrease in enrollment of roughly 14 students. The 2021-2022 certified enrollment number was 677.6 and the 2022-2023 certified enrollment is 663.10.

The Board discussed possible School Board Director District redistricting scenarios. After the recent census, it appears the director district boundary lines will change. The Board would like to analyze the possibility of three director districts and 2 atlarge directors instead of the current five director districts currently in place.

In a motion by Feldmann, seconded by Overman the meeting was adjourned at 6:49 p.m. All ayes. Carried.

Preschool News from Mrs. Ludovissy's Room

The preschoolers have been very busy learning through play! We completed our Back to School, All About Me, Family, Feelings, and Halloween Units. We learned our friends' name by singing songs, we enjoy playing with friends at recess and center time, and we continue to work on sharing and taking turns. We read the stories "We Are All Alike, We Are All Different" and "I like Me" and discussed the similarities and differences between our friends. We also read, "There Was An Old Lady Who Swallowed a Bat" and "Room on the Broom" and used retelling piecers to retell the story. Each day, we sing and dance to our good morning song and during our dance breaks, sing a finger play, complete an art project, or PE. In October, we started to learn our letters by building letters with playdough, tracing letters in sand or rice, and writing letters in shaving cream. We also started to learn our numbers, creating patterns, sorting, and counting. At centers, the kids independently rotate between our art center. sensory table, ABC/123, dramatic play, blocks, library, trains, and writing. At recess, the preschoolers enjoy playing: on our playground, basketball, stepping stones, and riding our trikes. Throughout our preschool day, the kids work on social skills by gaining a peer's attention, asking friends to play, sharing, taking turns, and giving a play idea. I cannot wait to see the preschoolers continue to grow!

The first quarter of school has been a busy one for our classroom! We started the year off in our reading curriculum by learning about what school is and why school is important.
