Maquoketa Valley staff and students continue to work hard to meet the academic and social emotional needs of all of our students. A recent article written by Elizabeth Kelsey from the *Telegraph Herald* on September 10, 2022 entitled, "Test Scores Show Academic Recovery," is proof that all of that hard work is paying off. The article included an overview of local districts 3rd, 8th, and 11th grade student proficiency scores in the areas of English-Language Arts and Mathmatics. Through ongoing professional learning opportunities, providing up-to-date technology and curriculum resources, and our caring and supportive staff we are looking forward to even better things to come. During Wednesday early outs and on full professional learning days, the staff at Maquoketa Valley will continue to focus on three main goals this school year including social-emotional behavioral health, assessment for learning, and providing a student centered learning environment.

Teachers are continuing to learn ways to implement social emotional & behavioral health (SEBH) into their classrooms. Our goal is to create a culture where children and adults have self-awareness, self-management, responsible decision making skills, relationship skills, and are socially aware in all of the PK-12 classroom settings. During the month of September, Pat Lehmann, a school improvement consultant from Keystone AEA, is supporting our learning as we review our classroom layouts, rules & routines, and use of transitions. This reflection allows teachers to support students in various ways, while building a safe & secure learning environment, allowing students to maximize their learning potential. Another aspect of our professional learning is in the area of assessment for learning. During our Professional Learning Communities / Content Team time, conversations continue to focus on these data-driven questions:

- What do we want all students to know and be able to do? (universal instruction)
- How will we know if they learn it? (formative & summative assessments)
- How will we respond when some students do not learn? (differentiated instruction of universal instruction and / or the intervention system)
- How will we extend the learning for students who are already proficient? (differentiated instruction of universal instruction and / or the intervention system)

By exploring these questions and using classroom data to support academic interventions for all students, teachers are focused on helping students learn their grade-level material.

Our third professional development goal is focused on student-centered learning. Our goal is to increase student achievement by increasing educator capacity to improve student engagement, equity, and accessibility to learning. Teachers are working on improving their curriculum and teaching strategies, while focusing on increasing student engagement and technology integration in the classrooms. Teachers continually meet regularly to discuss student needs at monthly Student of Concern meetings at the elementary level and KidTalk meetings at the secondary level. An additional learning opportunity that is in place this year, allows for our district's paraprofessionals to receive their own professional learning once a month. This learning is focused on the needs of the paras and learning ways to implement strategies and supports that benefit the students.

Through all of these initiatives we will continue to uphold our mission to ensure high levels of learning to empower all students for lifelong success! We appreciate anyone who supports our students in anyway to ensure that our students are successful!

The regular meeting of the Maquoketa Valley Board of Education was called to order by President Donna Kunde at 5:30 p.m. on September 19, 2022. All motions carried unanimously unless otherwise noted.

The Board tabled Administering Oath of Office to the newly elected Board Member until the election results have been canvased and official results have been received.

Motion was made by Zietlow, seconded by Overman to approve the meeting agenda as presented. All ayes. Carried.

Motion was made by Overman, seconded by Zietlow to approve the consent items. All ayes. Carried.

Ms. Lau, Haley Ronnebaum and Alia Domeyer gave a brief presentation on their summer trip to the Royal Highland Show in Scotland.

Two open enrollment requests in and four open enrollment requests out were approved in a motion by Zietlow, seconded by Overman. All ayes. Carried.

In a motion by Zietlow, seconded by Overman the Board approved the lawn mower quote from Ellis Implement in the amount of \$8,256.30. The mower will be used at the Delhi campus. All ayes. Carried.

In a motion by Zietlow, seconded by Overman the Board granted the Superintendent the authority to approve open enrollment applications that are time sensitive and require approval prior to the next scheduled board meeting. All ayes. Carried.

Fund raising activities for the 2022-2023 school year were reviewed and approved in a motion by Overman, seconded by Zietlow. All ayes. Carried.

In a motion by Overman, seconded by Zietlow the 2022-2023 Classified Staff Handbook and Certified Employee Handbook were approved. All ayes. Carried.

In a motion by Zietlow, seconded by Feldmann the Board approved filing the application to the SBRC for Modified Allowable Growth for negative 2021-2022 Special Education balance in the amount of \$248,106.86. All ayes. Carried.

In a motion by Overman, seconded by Zietlow the Board appointed John Zietlow to the Delaware County Conference Board. All ayes. Carried.

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Regular Board Meeting September 19, 2022

High School Library, Delhi, Iowa

In a motion by Zietlow, seconded by Overman, Brenda Becker, Troy Osterhaus and Tiersa Frasher were approved as the District Level I Investigators and the Delaware County Sheriff Department was approved as Level II Investigators for the 2022-2023 school year. All ayes. Carried.

The District recently participated in the director redistricting process. Supt. Hoeger updated the Board on the new director districts. Further action will take place regarding this in December.

Supt. Hoeger also updated the Board on the Governor's Safety Grant. A vulnerability study has been scheduled for all buildings in January. The District may only use proceeds from the grant to purchase items that are recommended from the study. After the results from the study are received, a formal safety equipment plan will be determined.

The Board expressed their appreciation to the community for the support of the recently passed PPEL vote. Supt. Hoeger presented the Board with a proposed project schedule. It was determined that an architect would be needed for the bleacher and playground equipment projects. Supt. Hoeger will contact OPN regarding these projects.

Supt. Hoeger updated the Board on proposed Middle School Athletic admission prices. Further discussion regarding this will take place in the future.

The October board meeting will be held on October 24th instead of the regular scheduled third Monday.

The annual IASB Convention is currently scheduled for November 16-18th.

At 6:58 p.m. in a motion by Zietlow, seconded by Overman the Board entered into a closed session pursuant to Chapter 21.5(1)(i) of the Code of Iowa for the purpose of discussing evaluation of employees not covered by a collective bargaining agreement. A roll call vote was answered as follows: Kunde, Overman, Zietlow; all ayes. Carried.

At 7:19 p.m. the Board entered into open session.

In a motion by Zietlow, seconded by Overman the meeting was adjourned at 7:20 p.m. All ayes. Carried.
