Volleyball season comes to an end

Last Thursday Night the Wildcat Volleyball Team traveled to Edgewood Colesburg High School to compete in the Tri-Rivers Conference Tournament. The first opponent was the Ed-Co Vikings. The cats came out on the losing end, losing 0-2 (16-21, 14-21). Offensively, Kennedy Rausch led the team in assists (16). Lanni Beaman led in kills (5), followed by Alexis Halverson (4), and Haley Ronnebaum and Grace Richter (3 each). Defensively, Lili Bauers led in digs (7), followed by Kiera Leytem, Haley Ronnebaum, Binaka Ronnebaum, and Grace Richter (3 each). The cats served just over 90% from the line, but it was not enough to defeat the Vikings.

The team then played Central City in a battle of the Wildcats. The sets were very up and down but our Maquoketa Valley Wildcats proved to be the better cats, winning 2-1 (21-14, 11-21, 15-13). On the offensive end, Rausch led in assists (19). Haley Ronnebaum and Lanni Beaman led in kills (9 each), followed by Richter (3). Defensively, Bauers led in digs (13), followed by Beaman (10). Haley Ronnebaum was on top of the blocks (3). The team had two aces from the line, coming from Bea-

man and Rausch (1 each), to claw their way to a victory over Central City.

The team then challenged the East Buchanan Buccaneers in their last game of the day, and came out victorious by a final score of 2-0 (21-12, 21-11). Rausch led in assists(16). Richter was on top of the kills (6). Bauers led in digs (9). Haley Ronnebaum had blocks(2). The squad ended the day going 2-1 and gained some confidence going into district play.

The first round of district games took place on Monday night, which took the Wildcats squad to Troy Mills to take on the Lynx of North Linn. The team battled a tough 4 sets, but ended up losing 1-3 (21-25, 13-25, 26-24, 14-25). Offensively, Rausch led in assists (31). Haley Ronnebaum led in kills (15), followed by Beaman (6), and Richter and Halverson (4 each). On the defensive end, Bauers led in digs (28), Knipper and Beaman (17 each), and Bianka Ronnebaum (13). The team served 94.6% as a team, with an ace coming from both Knipper and Huber, but it was not enough to defeat the Lynx, and bringing the volleyball season to an end.

Rausch was recognized for reaching the 500 assist milestone.

MV has left its mark on several courses, and the hills of Fillmore couldn't stop some Wildcats from their goal: State Cross Country.

Freshman Taryn Burbridge finished seventh in the girls race which punched her ticket to state. She ran 22:01.9, which is nearly identical to her time when she ran that course in September.

Sophomore Matthew Schaul will be making a return trip to State after his sixth place finish in 17:45.98. When Matthew ran that course at the Sept. 15 meet, he ran a 18:28.

The state meet is in Fort Dodge, with 1A and 2A running on Friday, Oct. 28. The 1A girls' race starts at 10:30 with the boys starting at 11:15.

Every Monday, Wednesday, and Saturday all of these athletes are up at the crack of dawn, pushing themselves to be better in the weight room. The atmosphere in the room has been scarce for the last couple of years. Each of the guys pushes one another to "get one more," but ultimately the intensity has been brought to Maquoketa Valley from all the coaches, but one specifically, Coach Orr. After the first game, senior Lucas Orcutt thought of a way that would make this team



closer. He wanted this team to be more than a team; he wanted it to be a family. Now, every Saturday after weightlifting, all of the guys go to Sunset Family Restaurant in Manchester. These boys have successfully become a family. Carter Klaren, another senior on the team, stated something very similar. "We are a family this year. All of these guys care about each other and would do anything for one another."

"I love you guys." Those are the words that Coach Arnold heard from a player on the bus ride home after winning against Starmont. These boys care about one another but they also care about everyone at Maquoketa Valley. These players aren't only responsible on the field, but they also show it in the classroom. The guys make sure they have completed assignments, along with keeping their grades up so they are eligible to play. Outside of the classroom and the field, these players positively represent Maquoketa Valley.

As the Wildcats begin their postseason, they are here to prove a lot of people wrong. Lucas Orcutt and Carter Klaren, the seniors, will never get these days back. These two will do everything in their power to lead this team as far as they possibly can go. "We want that success. We want to play as long as possible. Make memories as long as we can because nothing is guaranteed," concluded Coach Arnold.
