Last Saturday the wrestlers traveled to MFL Mar-Mac to compete in Class 1A Districts for a chance to earn a spot at the IHSAA Iowa State Wrestling Championships. Three wrestlers advanced: Nathan Beitz, a sophomore, wrestling in the 195 weight class; Brady Davis, a junior, wrestling in the 220 weight class; and Aidan Salow, a junior, wrestling in the 285 weight class.

The state tournament commenced Wednesday at Wells Fargo Arena in Des Moines. Both Beitz and Davis earned first round byes. Salow pinned Cade Bonnette of Denver in 1:01. He lost to Alex Kaufmann of Wilton by fall at 3:52. He then pinned his next two opponents, Zach Pearce of Rockford at 2:24 and Derek Hilsenbeck of Wapsie Valley at :59. He will first face Keegan McMillen of West Sioux on Friday.

Beitz won his first match with a 7-0 decision over Trent Wilkerson of New London and then went on to defeat Ashton Honnold of Nodaway Valley 6-3 to get into the semi-finals on Friday.

Davis defeated his first opponent, Brayden Tew of West Monona-Whiting, by a 7-4 decision. He then lost by fall at 4:48 to Jared Thiry of Don Bosco. Davis will start Friday taking on Logan Wright of West Branch.



Last Friday night, the girls team hosted a first round playoff game against the Central City Wildcats. Our Wildcats of Maquoketa Valley came out hot and never looked back, jumping to a 39-17 lead at half and winning by a final score of 68-26. Bianka Ronnebaum led the scoring (22), shooting 6/7 from behind the arc. Kennedy Rausch had (15), on 5-3 pointers. Leah Reicher was next (13), and Grace Richter (9). Bianka Ronnebaum and Grace Richter led the team in boards (6), followed by Haley Ronnebaum (5), Rausch (3). The team distributed the ball well with a total of 23 assists, led by Bianka Ronnebaum completing her double-double (11), Knipper and Rausch (4), and Haley Ronnebaum (3).

This Tuesday, the girls team traveled all the way to Turkey Valley to compete against the Trojans in another "win or go home" game. The team beat the Trojans by a final score of 61-38. That win left the Wildcats with a 15-9 overall record.

Tonight the team hosts Ed-Co in the District final.

This past week started the postseason for boys basketball. The MV boys played a home game against Clarksville on Tuesday. They won 65 to 36.

Scorers included Lance McShane, 22; Kody Hoeger, 15; Avery Holtz, 12; Treyton Cook, five; Toby Grimm, four; Brady Wall, three; Anderson Holtz, two; and Tate Intorf, two.

There were a total of 27 rebounds that night. McShane had 13, Kody Hoeger had four, and Wall had three. Cook and Grimm had two each, and Anderson Holtz and Intorf had one each, as well. For assists, Avery Holtz had five, Grimm had two, and Cook and Anderson Holtz had one each, for a total of nine assists.

The team played yesterday against Turkey Valley and came away with a 47-42 win. They will take on North Linn Tuesday. Avery Holtz became MV's sixth highest scorer after surpassing the previous number 6: Mr. Osterhaus.

It must be an Iowa State thing to fall to unranked squads after beating a higher-ranked team than them. After winning against #15 Oklahoma, the Cyclones have since lost to Kansas State, Baylor, and West Virginia. They came back with a win over #17 Texas this Monday, but now they have to prepare for a revenge game against the Baylor Bears.

The #2 Iowa Hawkeye men's wrestling team has been putting on a show as of recently. Even though they lost to the #1 team in the country right now (Penn State), they came back with a close win over #12 Minnesota and a dominating performance against #9 Michigan. They host their Senior Night this Sunday against #6 Oklahoma State.

Meanwhile, in Ames, they lost. I mean, yeah, the #3 Iowa State Cyclones wrestling team won against #18 Pitt, #14 Northern Iowa, and #20 Illinois, but they fell to #10 Missouri on Wednesday night. This match supposedly ended their season, but on their schedule they have a Last Chance Open written in. If they don't do this, then it's full steam ahead for the Big 12 Wrestling Championship on March 4th.

Jane Austen was born on December 16, 1775 in Steventon, New Hampshire. Her family was very close, made up of eight kids (six boys and two girls). At seven, Jane and her sister were sent to Oxford for school-



ing, but they were only there for a short while before contracting typhus. When she turned nine, they attended the Abbey School of reading until their father could no longer afford it. Their father and brothers managed to continue teaching them the rest of their schooling. She eventually began to fall in love with an Irish man named Tom Lefroy. Unfortunately, their relationship was doomed from the start as he was meant to marry for money.

In 1801, her father moved them to Bath, which was an area filled with rich people and high society manners. On the trip, she fell in love with a clergyman who promised to meet her in Bath. However, he became sick and passed away. Jane didn't enjoy life in Bath as she began her story The Watsons but never finished it. She also accepted a proposal from a family friend however, she took it back the next day. When her father passed away, they permanently relocated to Chawton, Her time at Chawton was her most productive time. She finished and published Sense and Sensibility, Pride and Prejudice, Mansfield Park, Emma, Persuasion, and Northanger Abbey. Both Sense and Sensibility and Pride and Prejudice were published under a pen name.

Her close relationships with her siblings meant that Jane's life was filled with opportunities to write. It also meant that her siblings could offer more details about her life. Jane's sister, Cassandra, was a very close companion to Jane, and the final letters from Jane to Cassandra reveal many details about her life. While writing Persuasion, she began to fall ill with what we now know to be Addison's disease. Her final two stories (*Persuasion* and *Northanger Abbey*) were published after she died. Cassandra was with Jane in her final moments and had asked her what she wanted. To which Jane replied:

"I want nothing but death."
