



Dying Words

by Cadence Freiburger On May 11, 1918,

On May 11, 1918, Richard Feynman was born in Queens, New York. He was very intelligent, mastering differential



and integral calculus and experimenting with and recreating topics before he went to college. At Massachusetts Institute of Technology, he earned his bachelor's degree and was named Putnam Fellow. Then, he got his Ph.D. at Princeton University. While in school, Feynman married his wife Arline Greenbaum, who suffered from tuberculosis.

Feynman began working with the Manhattan Project, per Robert R. Wilson's request, and visited his wife on weekends until she passed. Her death led to him throwing himself into his work on the atomic bomb. He was present at the Trinity bomb test, and he became the head of the Theoretical Division where he calculated how stable different parts of an atom bomb were. Then, to prevent an unstable portion causing an accident, he worked with safety engineers on rules and features. Feynman is also known for his work on the investigation into the Space Shuttle Challenger incident, where he pointed out what caused the crash.

Feynman then became a professor at Cornell University then CalTech, where he worked on quantum electrodynamics, the physics of superfluidity in supercooled liquid helium, and developed tools for scientists themselves conducting research. Once remarried with two kids, Feynman shared the 1965 Nobel Prize in Physics with Julian Schwinger and Shinichiro Tomonaga. Feynman's personality was written into books like *Surely You're Joking, Mr. Feynman* and *What Do You Care About What Others Think?*, while his teachings were documented in The Feynman Lectures.

Feynman was 69 when he passed away with several rare forms of cancer. On February 15, 1988, Feynman's final words were:

"This dying is boring."
