

Both coaches had some good words to say about Grimm. "Toby had an unbelievable year considering this is his first year golfing. His work ethic, talent, and heart will take him far no matter the sport or activity. Toby has all the intangibles to be great at this sport and we are already looking forward to next season."

Elvis Presley was born in Tupelo, Mississippi, on January 8, 1935. He then moved to Memphis, Tennessee, and he graduated in 1953.



Elvis's

music was greatly inspired by pop, country, gospel, and black R&B. His career started with Sun Records in 1954. Then, he began recording with RCA Victor, and he became famous across the world. At the time, his music challenged social and racial barriers, and it began a new era of American music and pop culture.

His music gained so much success that he sold over one billion records, earning him gold, platinum, and multi-platinum records. 

From Mr. Hoeger: Bleacher renovation project update

Maquoketa Valley School Community,

We have many projects we are working on at Maquoketa Valley. The major project is the replacement of the football bleachers. We are anticipating the project to be completed in late August. There was a storage facility under our old bleachers and we are planning on our students building a new storage garage in the fall under the direction of our Industrial Technology teacher, Mr. Palmer.

Below are some computer renderings of the new bleachers. The first photo shows the entry to the new bleachers looking from west to east. You will see that the patio will extend from our current patio directly onto the bleachers. This will make the bleachers very handicap accessible. There is a set of steps to get from the patio to the sidewalk in the bottom of the photo. This is where our patio ends currently. Both the home and visitor bleachers are set back from the track in case there is an interest in the future to expand the track from six to eight lanes.



The next photo gives you an idea of what the press box will look like. There are five rooms in the press box. There is also a platform on each side of the press-box for people to stand outside and videotape. The capacity of the home section of bleachers is 952 plus 8 handicap seats.

The handicap seats are not shown in this rendering but there will be several sections cut from the first row of seats allowing wheelchairs to back up to the second row.



The last rendering shows the visitor bleachers looking from the seat to the east. This set of bleachers has 232 seats plus 5 handicapped seats. As shown in this picture, there is a handicapped accessible ramp on the west side and a set of steps on the east side. We believe this project will be a great addition to Maquoketa Valley that will last for generations.
