# MV stadium gets a new look

If you've been to any of the football games this year, or perhaps on a walk around the track, you've probably noticed the shiny new bleachers on our grounds. This project took place during the summer, and finished up around the beginning of the school year. I emailed Mr. Hoeger with a couple basic questions.

### How much did the project cost?

The total cost of the bleacher project was \$1,049,917. This included demolition of the old bleachers, new bleachers on the home and visitor side, the new concrete patio and fence leading to the new home bleachers, press box, new fencing under the bleachers, and the sod for the grass area next to the home bleachers. The project was funded by the Physical Plant and Equipment Levy (PPEL). This levy was used to fund physical additions to school properties.

How does it compare to the old bleachers? The new bleachers on the home side seat 952 plus 8 handicap seats for a total of 960. The visitor bleachers seat 232 plus 5 hand-



icap for a total of 237. I am not sure of the seating capacity of the old bleachers. **Why did this project need to be done?** The old bleachers were really starting to show their age and we were interested in getting new bleachers before we had a structural failure and someone got hurt.

Thanks are in order to all the behind-the-scenes people helping with the preparation, demolition, and construction of the bleachers. It's a great addition to our well-kept school!



# Wildcats make the homecoming game one to remember



The varsity team fought hard but fell short. The MV team lost with the overall score of 3-1 (1. 25-23 CC 2. 25-16 MV 3. 29-27 CC 4. 25-19 CC).

The varsity team was led by Haley Ronnebaum and Grace Richter with the most aces of the night. Ronnebaum and Richter had two aces against the other Wildcats. Following Ronnebaum and Richter was Keira Leytem and Bianka Ronnebaum. Both of these girls had one ace. All of the aces last Thursday were performed by these four players. Lily Huber led the Wildcats in serving success percentage. Huber had 100% serve efficiency. Overall Lili Bauers had the most successful serves. Bauers made 16 of her serves and only missed one serve all night.

On the defensive side of the net the MV Wildcats had a total of 14 blocks. Leading the Wildcats in blocks was Camryn Paris and Haley Ronnebaum. Paris had 5 blocks and Ronnebaum had 4 total blocks all night. The digs category was led by Lili Bauers. Bauers had a total of 29 digs out of the 95 team digs. Following Bauers was Bianka Ronnebaum. Ronnebaum had 18 digs on the night.

Haley Ronnebaum led the team once again in kills on the night. Ronnebaum had 18 kills against the Central City team. Following right behind Ronnebaum was Grace Richter. Richter had 16 kills. The whole Wildcat team had a total of 62 kills last Thursday night. Keira Leytem does not want that ball to touch the ground and that is shown with her 47 assists in one night. Leytem let four other girls help with ten more assists on the night.

This past weekend, the varsity team competed in the West Delaware Invitational tournament and went 1-4 for the day with a win against Ed-Co. The Wildcats fell to Vinton-Shellsburg (1-2), Independence (1-2), Western Dubuque (0-2) and West Delaware (0-2).

This past Tuesday the Wildcats took on Springville in an away matchup and came home victorious. MV won 3-1 (25-22, 25-16, 21-25, 27-25).

Game leaders were Leytem with 22 assists, Haley Ronnebaum with with 13 kills and 2 blocks and Bianka Ronnebaum with 29 digs. Huber was 4 for 4 from the serving line with one ace.



Although it may not seem like it, many teens around us are affected by teenage alcohol abuse. According to the NIH (National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism) in 2021 almost six million people, who were ranging from 12 - 20 years of age, disclosed that they had been drinking more than "just a few sips" of alcohol in the past month. NIH also reports that youth are more likely to binge drink than adults. What may seem like some childish fun during homecoming week, a birthday, or prom is actually the start to almost all drinking addictions. It is the same situation as smoking, where once you do it, it's almost impossible to turn back. Some may say that teenage drinking won't affect them later on in life; others say that it's how they learn from their mistakes. 
