When you hear the word "dragon" you may think of ferocious beasts that breathe flames with giant wings and sharp talons. Although not large, winged, or fire-breathing, the armadillo girdled lizard (also called the dragon armadillo lizard) resembles dragons. These fantastic-looking creatures live for up to 20-25 years and are about 6-8 inches in length. To defend itself, the armadillo girdled lizard will take the end of its tail in its mouth and curl up into a circle.

The strong scales on its back and spikes on its tail. The armadillo girdled lizard is native to desert areas, specifically in South Africa. Their diet consists of insects, fruit, and leaves. The males and females have multiple mating partners, and mate between September and October. However, unlike most reptiles that lay eggs, the females give birth to one or two offspring. The females give birth once a year, but may sometimes take year-long breaks between pregnancies. The only sexual dimorphism in armadillo girdled lizards is that the males are slightly larger. They also communicate with each other through tongue flicks, tail wags, and head bobs.
