




On Thursday the Wildcats had a make up meet against the Ed-Co Vikings. It was a bit cold and rainy but the team pulled through.

Welcome back, divers! This week we will be taking a look at a species of invertebrates that can either be cute or horrifying to look at. The tunicates, otherwise known as sea squirts can range in many different colors and sizes, but they are relatively small individually. But, in groups, they can be invasive. A fun fact about tunicates is that they are the invertebrates that are the most closely related to us! Since there is such a wide variety of what these invertebrates could look like, I will just go over some facts about some interesting ones and what they do.

Some sea squirts stick to rocks and other hard materials in the ocean and live their whole life on that surface, and some float freely and look like jello in the ocean. The sea squirts that float freely can be long and can be up to 60 feet! But, one common factor about all sea squirts is the function that they all do when touched. When an organism touches a sea squirt, it convulses and squirts out water, which is how it gets its name. Sea squirts have similar digestive systems to us, but they also have heartbeats that at times will reverse, which is a mystery that still hasn't been solved by scientists.

You might be wondering, what do these creatures provide for us? Well, in some parts of the world people will enjoy eating sea squirts. Or, they have been proven to be good treatments for asthma and even cancer. The endangerment status of these creatures is okay because some species become very invasive after being imported by sticking on the underside of boats and destroying the equipment.

The bill of a duck and the tail of a beaver, the platypus was thought to be a hoax when it was first discovered in 1797. However, the appearance of the duck bill and beaver tail are a misconception.

The bill is soft and rubbery, and is structured nothing like a bill. Platypi use their "bills" to look for food and burrow underwater since their eyes, ears, and nose close while they're underwater. The platypus will shake it's head back and forth to find electrical pulses created by animals, as well. Platypi eat insects, fish, crustaceans, and more. They will often hold stones in their cheek pouches to grind up food since adults don't have any teeth. A platypus's tail is also soft and furry, unlike a beaver's.

Platypi have venomous spurs on their back flippers. The males keep them throughout their lives, while the females lose them after one year. When a platypus walks on land it folds its front flippers to reveal its claws.

Platypi are about 1.5 feet long and weigh 3 pounds. The sexual dimorphism in this species consists of the males being slightly larger than the females. They can live up to 10 years, and will start mating at 4 years old. Platypi are monotreme mammals, meaning that they lay eggs. A platypus will lay 1-3 eggs and incubates them by holding them against her stomach with her tail. The babies suck their mother's milk directly from her skin and fur since platypi don't have nipples like other mammals.

Wild platypi are found in Australia, and have to have a source of freshwater in their habitat. Their natural predators consist of foxes, snakes, cats, and dogs. However, their loose skin makes it difficult for predators to get a firm grip on them, allowing the platypus time to get away.

In 2020, it was discovered that platypi glow blue or teal under UV light. Platypi are most active at night, which leads some to believe that platypi developed biofluorescense to help them adapt to the lack
