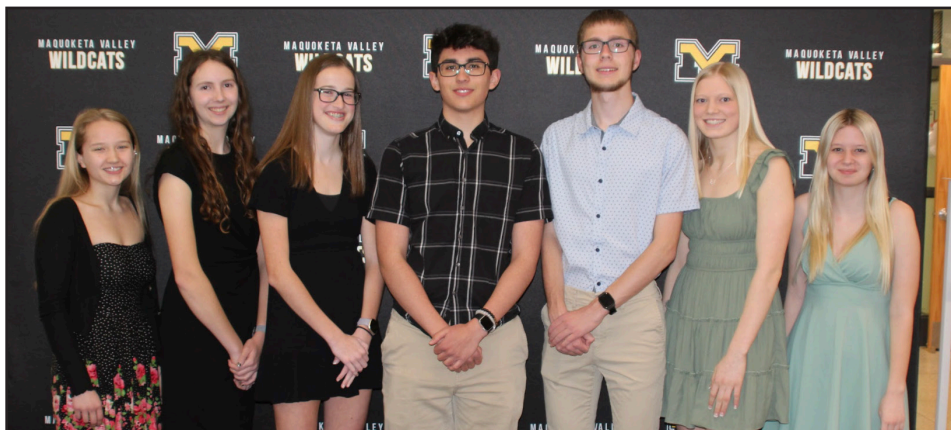

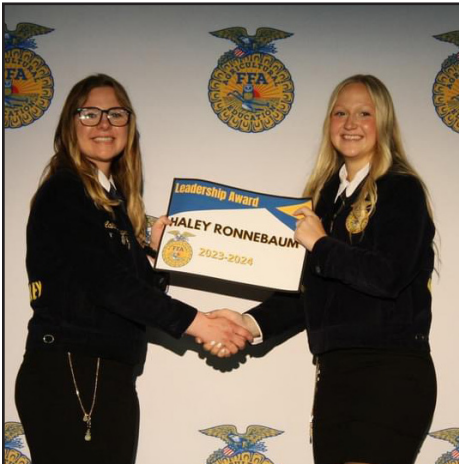

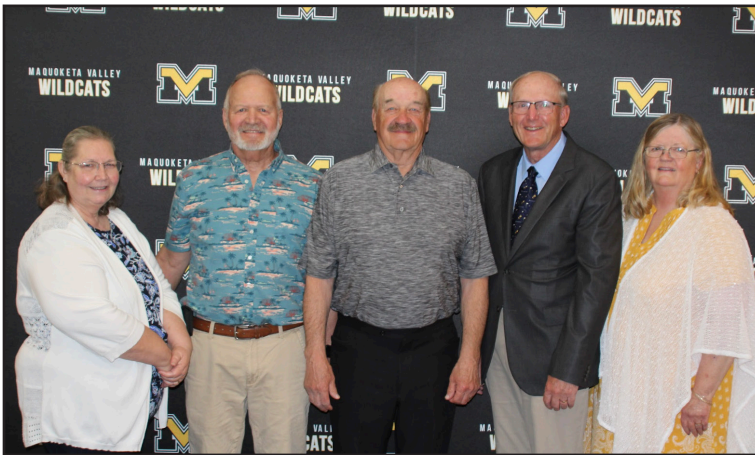

The regular meeting of the Maquoketa Valley Board of Education was called to order by President Donna Kunde at 5:30 p.m. on April 24, 2024 in the High School Library in Delhi, Iowa. All motions carried unanimously unless otherwise noted.

At 5:31 p.m., President Donna Kunde declared this to be the time and place to hold the hearing on the proposed budget for the 2024-2025 school year. The proposed tax rate is \$9.84 which is a reduction of \$0.10 from FY24. It was noted that the District published at 3.0% SSA due to the fact that the State had not yet set the FY25 SSA rate. The Department of Management will make the required adjustments to reflect the 2.5% SSA set by the State. The documents were reviewed and there being no comments, the Board President declared the hearing closed at 5:33 p.m. in a motion by Dabroski, seconded by Feldmann. Motion by Zietlow, seconded by Overman to approve the budget estimate as presented. A roll call vote was answered as follows: Dabroski, Feldmann, Kunde, Overman, Zietlow; all ayes. Carried.

Echo Exhibition

In honor of *Puffs*, or *Seven Increasingly Eventful Years at a Certain School of Magic* and *Magic* this weekend, this week's exhibition will be on badgers! The European badger is a part of the mustelidae family, which also includes weasels, otters, and skunks. Badgers are known for their short legs, stout bodies, and bold black-and-white facial markings.

They create dens that are called "sets", and spend most of their lives in them. They live in areas with low-lying vegetation and grass to conceal their dens with open expanses bordering forests and are mostly concentrated in Ireland to Eastern China, as well as the Arctic Circle to Southern China. Badgers are generally nocturnal and use their strong jaws and claws to gather food. Badgers are omnivores and will eat pretty much anything, from fruit, mushrooms, small mammals, and more. However, their favorite food is earthworms.

Badgers will also use designated "bathrooms" outside of their homes to relieve themselves and will use them consistently. Their groups will usually consist of six adult badgers who tolerate each other, but will not work together as a group. Badgers also have scent glands which help to identify individuals within their group. Babies are born inside of their sets, and usually, three badgers are born, but up to six can be born at a time. Badgers weigh less than a pound when they're born, and adults weigh between 22 and 35 pounds with the males being slightly heavier. Females can delay egg implantation in their uteruses, causing their gestation period to be 9 to 12 months.

While Badgers can live up to 15 years in the wild, their biggest threats are human-related. Often badgers are killed by vehicles such as cars or trucks and are also accused of causing damage to property or livestock.
