The Wildcats didn't have to travel last week Thursday. Clayton Ridge and Jesup came to play against the Wildcats. The girls went 1-1 winning against Clayton Ridge.

The varsity team started out by playing against Jesup. The team fell just short of a win (21-18 and 21-13).

"Thursday night we showed some good aggressive plays, we just need to dial in and execute," stated coach Nefzger. Against Jesup Kelsey Hoeger had the most successful serves with seven successful serves. Lili Bauers and Lanni Beaman both had six successful serves following Hoeger. On the defensive court Lanni Beaman led with most blocks against Jesup. Beaman had two blocks against the J-Hawks. Lili Bauers also led for the highest number of digs. Bauers had an amazing 17 digs. Again, it is very early in the season but we finished our season last year with a team serving efficiency of 84.7%." Lili Bauers, Grace Richter and Macee Nolan all contributed by having an ace in the game. The sophomores dominated with their blocking against Clayton Ridge. Both Ava Knipper and Camryn Paris had two solo blocks against the Ea-

gles. Lili Bauers also improved her digs by having five more digs against Clayton Ridge than Bauers had against Jesup by having 23 digs against the Eagles. Jumping over to the offense for the Wildcats. Macee Nolan led with the most assists. Nolan had 13 assists. Grace Richter did not stop her fire and led the team once again for most kills in the two sets. Richter had seven kills totaling out to be 16 kills on the night for the Wildcats.

In a motion by Overman, seconded by Feldmann the Board approved the 2024-2025 Kirkwood Concurrent Enrollment Partnership Contract. This allows students to take classes from Kirkwood through the Jones Regional Center in Monticello and earn college credits while still in high school. All ayes. Carried.

The board approved the call for bus bids to be purchased in FY26 in a motion by Zietlow, seconded by Dabroski. All ayes. Carried.

In a motion by Zietlow, seconded by Feldmann the 2024-2025 fundraising requests were approved. All ayes. Carried.

In a motion by Feldmann, second by Overman the Board approved the 2024-2025 Bus Driver Handbook and Preschool Handbooks were approved. All ayes. Carried.

In a motion by Dabroski, seconded by Feldmann the Board approved the out-of-district senior citizen's pass. Currently, any senior citizen (age 65) that lives within the district, is eligible to receive a senior citizen pass free of charge. This pass allows them admission into any event held at MV free of charge. This is a lifetime pass. The out-of-district senior citizen pass would allow any senior citizen that lives outside of the district the opportunity to purchase a lifetime pass for \$50. Roll call vote was answered as follows: Dabroski, Feldmann, Kunde, Zietlow, ayes; Overman, nay. Carried.

In a motion by Zietlow, seconded by Overman the 2024-2025 Bound Agreement with ASPi was approved. All ayes. Carried.

The Board approved the 2024-2025 Letter of Agreement with Monticello for the Alternative High School in a motion by Overman, seconded by Feldmann. All ayes.

In a motion by Feldmann, seconded by Dabroski the Board approved the 2024-2025 Concurrent Enrollment Contract with Northeast Iowa Community College. Again, this allows students to earn college credits while still in high school. The courses may be taken online or in-house by students that elect to enroll. All ayes. Carried.

In a motion by Dabroski, seconded by Zietlow the Board approved out of state FFA travel request from Ms. Lau for the World Dairy Expo in Madison, WI on October 1, 2024, and the National FFA Convention & Expo in Indianapolis, IN on October 22 –26th. All ayes. Carried.

The Iowa Association of School Boards Convention is Nov. 20-22nd.

The September board meeting will be held on September 23rd at 5:30 p.m. in the High School Library.

The open enrollment process has been very fluid this summer. It appears the district will see a positive enrollment trend this year.

Director Kunde discussed reviewing IASB Lighthouse topics each month. Further discussion of this will take place in September,

The meeting was adjourned at 6:50 p.m. in a motion by Feldmann, seconded by Overman. All ayes. Carried.



Deep Pive by Arianna Nolan



Welcome back, Divers! Now that we are back into full swing into school, it's time to learn about the creatures of the sea again! This week, we will be taking a look at a wondrous jellyfish of the deep blue sea. The Deep Sea-Crown jellyfish is what we will be taking a closer look at today through our diver goggles. This creature is a beautiful crimson red color, and is about 15 centimeters in length (6 inches). This jellyfish is one of the most common, and can be found in every ocean in the world, but that doesn't mean it's not interesting to learn about! This jellyfish has a tentacle that is about six times longer than its bell, which is like the head to other animals. It uses this tentacle to catch prey while it's swimming by.

So what does the Deep Sea-Crown jellyfish eat? Usually, these jellyfish prey on plankton and small crustaceans. What makes this jellyfish so unique is how it is able to survive when food is limited, while the predators are plentiful. It is able to protect itself from predators because it is able to hide itself so well. These jellyfish are located in the midnight zone of the ocean which is around 3,300 feet to 13,000 feet down, according to the NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration). So while it may appear red to us, it is dark, black color to the predators. These jellyfish are also able to admit a light that is a warning to predators to back off in case their camouflage doesn't work.

There is still a lot to be learned about these spectacular creatures, which is I recommend you go do your own research at the website Montery Bay Aquarium Research Institute, which is where all the information I got from this creature came from.
