Wildcats keep pace at Anamosa, Jesup meets

Following their strong showing in Jesup, the Wildcats continued their season at the Anamosa cross country meet, where both the girls and boys varsity teams put in gritty performances on a tough course.

For the girls vrsity, senior Taryn Burbridge led the way again, finishing 28th with a time of 22:47.1. Anna Feldmann followed at 23:15.1 for 34th place, and Breanna Bush came through in 23:28.3 for 38th. Rylee Reed crossed at 27:24.9 (90th), with Kourtney Hatfield close behind at 27:53.2 (93rd). Jena Hoefer and Haydin Flannagan rounded out the squad with times of 30:50.6 and 33:15.1, placing 115th and 124th respectively.

On the boys' side, Kenyon Baker once again led the charge, finishing 27th in 18:33.3. Owen Smith followed with a strong 18:59.3 for 35th place. Jayden Schwandt ran a 22:14.4 to place 101st, while Colt Haas and Gabriel Saunders finished in 24:14.6 and 28:10.1, earning 126th and 146th, respectively.

The Wildcats continue to show depth and determination as they build to-


ward the postseason. With each meet, their pack grows stronger.

The Maquoketa Valley Wildcats cross country team brought grit and determination to the Jesup Golf and Country Club on September 30.

Girls varsity placed 16th as a team, with senior Taryn Burbridge leading the pack. She crossed the finish line in 21:41.1, securing 24th place individually. Close behind was Anna Feldmann, who ran a steady 22:19.1 to take 38th. Breanna Bush pushed through for 81st place with a time of 23:58.6, and Kourtney Hatfield rounded out the squad at 26:41.2, placing 116th. The girls showed heart and hustle on a challenging course.

Boys Varsity saw Kenyon Baker fly through the 5K in 17:36.6, landing 16th place and setting the tone for the team. Owen Smith followed with a solid 18:39.0 finish, placing 49th. Colt Haas battled through the final stretch to finish in 24:35.8, earning 150th.

The Jesup meet tested endurance and focus, with rolling fairways and crisp fall air adding to the challenge. But the Wildcats held their own, showing that they're a force to be reckoned with this sea-

Welcome back Divers to another edition of Deep Dive! Today, we will be looking at a creature that may look very scary from the outside, but is actually quite friendly and harmless: the basking shark. The basking shark is a very large shark and is actually the second-largest fish in the world! They can grow up to 40 feet long and weigh over 5 tons. Some of the nicknames for this fish are sunfish, bone shark, and elephant shark. These fish are found all around the world, and can be seen swimming near the surface of the ocean with their mouth wide open. People often get scared of this shark because they believe it's a great white when its fin is sticking out of the water; however, its fin is smoother than the great white's.

This fish, although it makes it look dangerous, is actually very harmless to humans and often only attacks when they are attacked first. When they eat, they open their gigantic mouth and filter through the gallons of seawater to eat large zooplankton, and not humans. Little is known about how these creatures reproduce; however, sometimes these creatures can be seen jumping out of the water at random times. Scientists believe that this is the shark's way of trying to get rid of any parasites they happened to pick up while they were eating. The only true predator of the basking shark is the great white shark.

The basking shark is an endangered species for the reason that they are often overfished for their fins, gills, and meat. You can stop the overfishing of these creatures by looking online for petitions or being cautious of the seafood you are eating.
